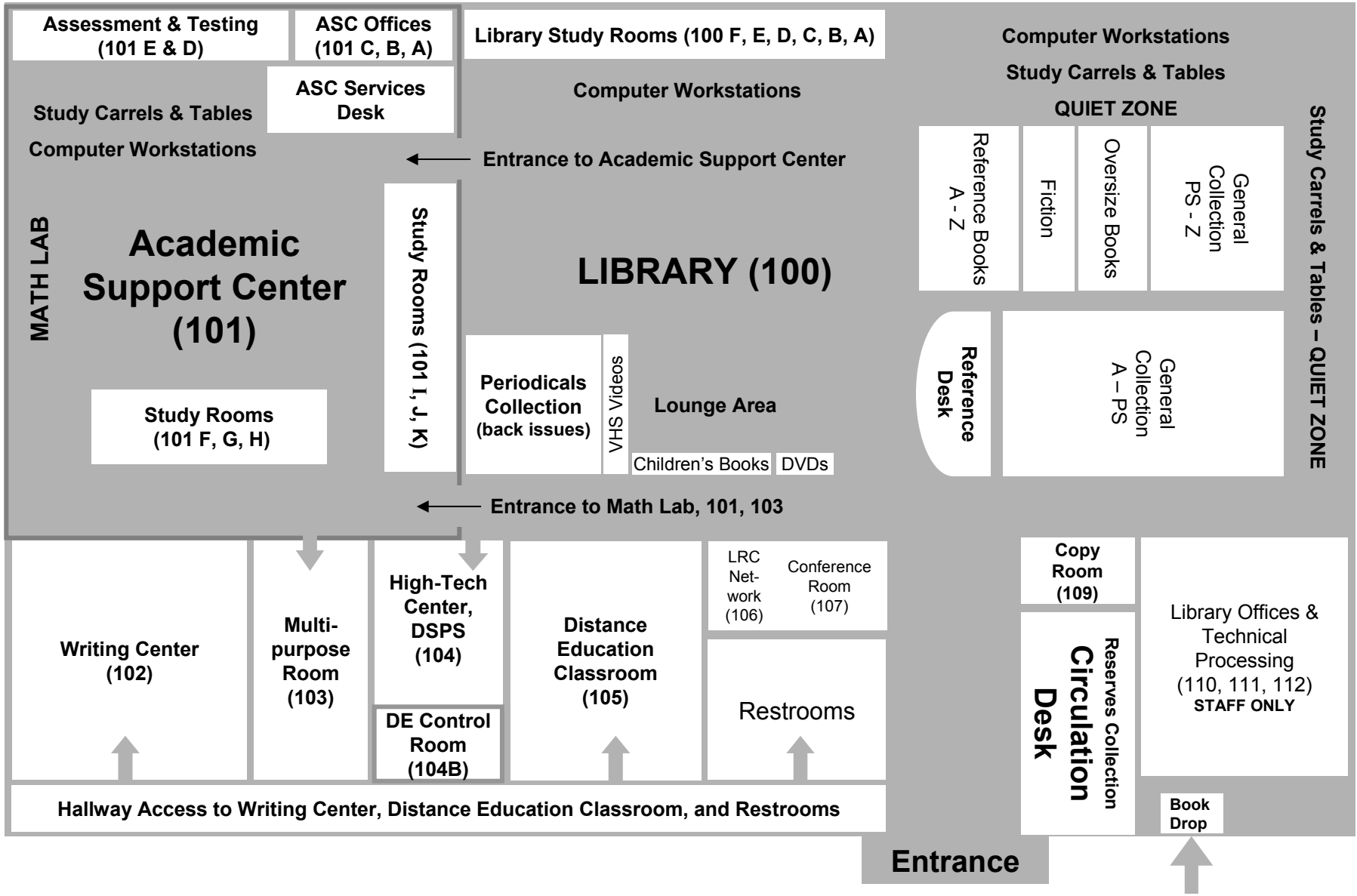

Learning Resource Center College of the Redwoods Eureka Campus

The LEARNING RESOURCE CENTER (LRC) opened Fall 2002, and houses the Library, the Academic Support Center, the Math Lab, the Writing Center, the High Tech Center, and a Distance Education classroom; all are equipped with computers with Internet access and MS Office application software. There are seats for 567 students in open study areas, in lounge areas, at computer stations, in group or private study rooms, media viewing rooms, and classrooms.

100 - The LIBRARY provides access to print and electronic resources. Course materials and textbooks are on reserve at the Circulation Desk. Faculty, students, staff, and residents of the District may borrow library materials. Ask the Reference Librarian if you need research, internet, or computer help.

101 - The ACADEMIC SUPPORT CENTER (ASC) provides free tutoring and learning / study strategies by drop-in or by appointment; instruction services on essay writing, speech preparation, grammar, punctuation, MLA and APA documentation, and résumé writing; computer-aided instruction programs; DSPS and make-up testing; and English and Math skills evaluation.

101 – The MATH LAB is located in the ASC. Students who enroll in Math 152 may earn ½ to 1 unit, will receive quick, individual assistance for specific math problems, and can study math homework in a supportive environment. The Math Lab is staffed by CR instructors and peer tutors who are available to assist students on a one-to-one basis. More intensive tutoring is available on referral.

102 - The WRITING CENTER: Students must enroll in English 350L, English 150L, or English 152 to use the Writing Center where English instructors and trained tutors assist students who want to improve their writing skills. English 152 is a writing lab; students earn credit units per number of hours in the Writing Center.

104 - The HIGH TECH CENTER, of Disabled Student Programs and Services, has a Braille printer, print reader, speech activated software, screen readers and magnifiers, and 12 computers, and provides information access for students with little or no computer experience. Students must enroll in the Guidance 379 – 380 courses, which cover various introductory computer topics.

105 – In the DISTANCE EDUCATION classroom, instructors may teach using a projection screen, document camera, video tape, DVD, Video CD, or audio tape. The class may also function as a computer lab. A class can be broadcast to the branch campuses or received from off campus sources. Videotaped class sessions are archived on the Eureka campus for student viewing.
