Catalog Description

A course covering the sociology of agriculture presented through an examination of relationships between societies and their environments, economics, and agriculture. Emphasis will be on the analysis of agriculture's use of technology and the corresponding impact on the environment, economy and society.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

1. Assess the significance of biotechnology in providing a full or partial solution in addressing food supply and environmental challenges and appraise the risks in utilizing biotechnology for these purposes.

2. Analyze and identify the global impacts of agriculture industrialization, corporatization and globalization of food production.

3. Analyze current socio-political and ethical issues in agriculture.

Course delivery: This course is delivered and taught 100% online; there are no classroom meetings. This is an asynchronous course, which means you do not need to be present online during any set times. You must complete work by assigned due dates.

Student Commitment: Students should expect to spend roughly nine hours per week on the course. This will consist of watching video lectures, completing assigned readings, participating in discussion boards, and submitting assignments on time.

Computer Skills:

Online courses require computer skills. Before beginning, make sure you can:

- navigate the course Learning Management System (Canvas),
- receive and respond to your CR email,
- upload and download files using Canvas, and
- use a word processor (such as Microsoft Word or Pages).

Technology Requirements: You should have high-speed internet (such as broadband) service from cable, DSL, orsatellite providers as there are videos that require this speed. You need to have reliable access to the internet for the duration of the course. Anticipate problems with your computer and internet access (including power outages) by not waiting until the last minute to submit assignments. It is your responsibility to meet the class deadlines.

Portable Devices vs. Computers: Although you can use late-model portable devices (such as Android or iOS phones & tablets) for some things, you should plan on doing most of your work (especially exams and assignments) from a reasonably late-model notebook or desktop computer (Mac or PC). Do NOT plan to participate in this class solely from a portable device. If you do decide to use your portable device for some of your class work, use the free Canvas app (called "Canvas by Instructure") available in iTunes (for iOS) and the Google Play Store (for Android). Do not try to connect to Canvas using a web browser on a portable device. Your experience with Canvas will be a lot better using the app.

Weekly Class Format

Refer to the Course Schedule below and/or weekly modules for topics and assignments each week. The regular layout is as follows:

Monday: Weekly lecture, readings, videos, question sets and discussion board or writing assignments are posted at 8am.

Saturday: First discussion board post due at 11:59pm (for weeks where discussions are assigned).

Monday (of following week): Two response discussion board posts due by 5pm. All assignments due by 5pm Mondays unless noted otherwise.

Writing Submissions

For weeks when writing submissions are assigned, that Monday a new writing prompt will be available. I will ask you to read or watch the content I provide as background context for responding to the writing prompt. Each writing submission is worth 25 points, and details for each will be provided at the time each are assigned.

Discussion Board Posts

For weeks when discussion boards are assigned, that Monday a new discussion board will be available to post on. I will ask you to read or watch the content I provide for the discussion board. You will then answer the discussion board questions. This is your initial post. **Initial discussion posts must be done by Saturday of the given week at 11:59pm**. You will then need to respond to two different peers' posts on the discussion board. These **response posts must be done by Monday at 5pm**. Your initial post will be graded by your thoughtfulness, detail, and effort. Your response posts will too be graded by effort and detail.

Question Sets

For most weeks, a question set will be assigned that will have questions based on the weekly lecture readings and/or lecture video/documentaries. AI Use Class Policy

Recent advancements in generative artificial intelligence (AI) have made large language models such as ChatGPT and Google's Bard widely available. However, overuse of these tools in this class can undermine your learning and curtail the development of your critical and creative thinking skills. In addition, AI outputs are often unreliable and frequently subject to bias. For these reasons, the policy of this class is that AI cannot be used at any point in the completion of class assignments, including discussion posts. Any or all of your assignment submissions and discussion posts may be screened by AI detection software, but the real penalty for AI misuse is that you will miss out on an opportunity to learn.

Disruptive Behavior

Student behavior or speech that disrupts the instructional setting will not be tolerated. Disruptive conduct may include, but is not limited to: unwarranted interruptions; failure to adhere to instructor's

directions; vulgar or obscene language; slurs or other forms of intimidation; and physically or verbally abusive behavior. In such cases where the instructor determines that a student has disrupted the educational process, a disruptive student may be temporarily removed from class.
