Catalog Description

A survey of the history of Western art from the early Renaissance through Postmodernism. Methods of analysis include an in-depth examination of the political, religious, philosophical, economic, and cultural contexts that influenced the development of visual styles in each historical period. Emphasis is placed on the understanding of formal, material, and symbolic qualities of artwork, the role of the artist, and on developing a wide range of visual, verbal, and written lexicons.

Course Student Learning Outcomes *(from course outline of record)*

1. Identify a broad range of processes and materials used to create works of art from the Renaissance through the Postmodern period.
2. Analyze visual or formal structure in works of two-dimensional and three dimensional art and architecture.
3. Identify subject matter and iconography in both western and non-western works of art from the Renaissance through the Postmodern period.
4. Analyze, discuss, and differentiate works of art within their proper cultural context.

Art History: Renaissance to Modern (August 23-December

Course Description:

A survey of visual art from the early Renaissance through Postmodernism. Topics explored include an artwork's cultural and historical context, particular periods and styles, and also the subtle psychology of individual artistic temperament.

Textbook:

Art History, Volume II, Marilyn Stokstad and Michael Cothren (5th or 6th edition). Supplementary reading may be required periodically and will be supplied by the instructor. There are TWO options for the textbook:

- REVEL Fully digital version of the textbook (supplementary printed available for additional \$20 when ordered online).
- Printed textbook (Portable edition recommended as a full section of the textbook is excluded from this course but only available in 5th edition used copied online, not at bookstore).

Preparation for class:

- Basic computer skills (navigate websites, open and download files, use word processor)
- A computer with connection to the internet (high speed DSL, cable or satellite is preferred)
- A reliable email account
- No prerequisite (English 150 recommended)
- *EDUC-203 Online Classes with Canvas* if new to online classes

This is a fully online course so there will not be any classroom time, and no assigned classroom.

Since it is an outside site you will have to register with a username and password though there is no cost. Once you are signed up for Voice Thread you will find the first [Voice Thread: Course Navigation \(Links to an external site.\)](#) that will help you understand how to navigate the course, all the elements of this course.

Class participation and attendance policy:

This is a 16 week, three unit course at College of the Redwoods which would have required 3 hours of in-class time per week and approximately 2-4 hours of additional time to complete course readings and assignments. You should be prepared to devote this same amount of time even though you will not be sitting in a classroom. Basically the only place you need to go is Modules. There you will find everything you need and can access any material.

Each week the Module is divided between TO LEARN and TO DO. TO LEARN includes the overview, Voice Thread lectures, links, and any other files of interest related to the topic. TO DO is quizzes, assignments, discussions, related files, and REVIEW is what we accomplished and any extra credit options if available.

Working ahead and keeping up:

Students are discouraged from working more than 1-2 weeks ahead unless there are extenuating circumstances. These can be approved by the instructor. Posting ahead of the Sunday deadline will give you additional opportunities to resubmit if your assignment is not complete. Try to keep up as much as possible. As you will see

there are many intricate links in this course and I apologize in advance for any glitches that arise from time to time. I am vigilant but also human and am always appreciative of those students who work ahead and let me know when something isn't working. I usually get it corrected the same day though I understand your frustrations (happens to me too). Links in Modules, especially for Voice Threads are 99% accessible, so if you have trouble with them go to Modules to get the link.

Expectations for the course:

Keeping up on reading and participation are crucial to getting the most out of this class. Do your best to stay caught up with us. Any student who has not adequately participated by Census date will be dropped from the class. Students will receive adequate notice if they are in danger of failing this class. After the Census it is up to the student to drop themselves.

Response time to email and messages is within 24 hours Monday through Friday though often is checked during the weekend. Grading occurs as we go along so partial grading will be given for work completed to that point with additional points when student has completed it. I observe students' privacy rights with no information disclosed to anyone including parents or guardians without the student's permission. Students who have specific counseling assistance should be aware when requests have been made for progress reports. This applies to athletes who periodically request updates sent to coaches. If student have exhibited difficulties in their progress they will be notified before the counselor or coach is notified.

Each week the opening page (Overview) is changed when all grading is complete. If you feel you have not been adequately graded it's possible I have not completed the grading so I request you wait until the Overview has changed to inquire about your grade. Response to every student during the week who feels they are "missing points" takes a tremendous amount of time away from attention to students' hard work.

Online commitment: your commitment will require at least as much time as you would dedicate to a traditional face to face class. Plan to be online at least 2-3 times per week. This online class requires weekly participation consistent with the college's semester schedule. Be sure to participate in discussions at the appropriate time and fully. Deadlines are firm, after which material is NO LONGER AVAILABLE. The Course Calendar will give you the dates so you can keep up with the work. The course is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Your final grade is based on the total points you have earned throughout the course. Extra credit points are added as we go along but are not required to achieve the grade points you see here. They can help if you have fallen behind or missed something. Canvas has a slightly confusing way of calculating points based on how many points have been attempted (i.e. 720/780 means you attempted 780 points worth of material and received 720). That is misleading, as there is likely to be more points “available”. Your number of points will be converted to a letter grade at the end of the course although periodically you will see an email letting you know where you are in points compared to where you should be by that time in the course. If you are keeping up you will not receive this email. Here is how the points translate to a letter grade.

You must become familiar with how online classes “work” before starting this class. It is not reasonable to expect to learn how to navigate at the same time that you are completing the work required to adequately participate in the class. The instructor can assist you minimally with specific course questions but is not equipped to teach you how to take an online class. This class is not the place to learn how to do word processing or other simple computer tasks. The college has preparatory courses for this (EDUC-203 Online Classes with Canvas).

As the instructor I dedicate as much or more time to this class compared to a traditional class. I feel as though I develop a relationship with each individual student and if sometimes I seem to be nagging you about your participation, it's only because I want every student in the class to succeed.

Don't hesitate to be in touch if you are having difficulties. Don't wait until the last week to let me know you have not been participating because you are involved in sports and haven't had the time for the class. I'm sympathetic but you should understand that I take your academic progress seriously and there isn't much I can do to help you if you wait too long. I expect a certain level of computer literacy for you to be successful. Once you get the flow of this course's navigation you should have no trouble as it's totally consistent from one week to the next and I give you clear directions. I know some students have to rely on less optimal devices such as tablets or cell phones to access the course and I understand the difficulty but the expectations are the same for your level of participation as it would be if you were using a desktop computer.

Tech equipment and skills are required for student success, and of equal importance as require textbooks and materials. Students can obtain a free Office 365 license (includes Word, Excel, Powerpoint and more) with a valid CR email. Chrome is the most reliable browser for Canvas.
