Catalog Description

An introductory survey course for non-majors designed to provide students with studio and lecture experience in the visual arts. Course covers drawing, painting, ceramics, printmaking, and sculpture and explores Western, non-Western, traditional and contemporary ways of art appreciation and production.

Course Student Learning Outcomes (from course outline of record)

- 1. Critique visual characteristics of artwork in oral and written formats.
- 2. Demonstrate familiarity with the main elements of art and principles of design.
- 3. Demonstrate basic proficiency with a broad range of two-dimensional and three-dimensional processes such as drawing, painting, printmaking, ceramics and sculpture.
- 4. Identify, analyze, and discuss the function of art and the role of the artist in diverse cultures and contexts.

Evaluation & Grading Policy

Challenge yourself! I reward more difficult projects with more points, even if they do not turn out as well. It's ok to take risks. I grade largely on effort and improvement, rather than how easily realistic drawing, painting, or sculpture comes to you.

All assignments are graded using points. I will publish rubrics on canvas for each assignment so you can see exactly how to earn points, and the exact reasons why you earned whatever grade you did.

In addition to your artwork assignments and a couple of quizzes, your participation in online discussion boards on canvas will also be graded. I strongly recommend that you log into Canvas at least once a week and keep up with the modules and due dates. If you do that, you will not be overwhelmed with work at the end of the term.

If you complete all of the assignments, you will pass for sure. While I grade a little more generously when assignments are handed in on time, I do not deduct points for late assignments. I will accept missing assignments until the last day of class.
