Catalog Description

A beginning level course that introduces students to a variety of concepts for visual expression and visual literacy in drawing: including line, composition, value, color, space, and perspective. Mediums include graphite, charcoal, ink, pastel, and collage.

Course Student Learning Outcomes (from course outline of record)

- 1. Investigation and experimentation with varied drawing media, including graphite pencil, charcoal, pen and ink, pastel, and collage.
- 2. Investigation and experimentation with process, including the varied approaches and techniques possible in particular drawing media.
- 3. Investigation and integration of drawing's expressive and communicative characteristics using line, shape, volume, value, composition, space, linear and atmospheric perspective, color, and texture.
- 4. Investigation and experimentation with subject matter, including still-life, nature study, landscape, portraiture, figure study, and abstract/non-objective imagery.
- 5. Investigation and integration of subjective and personal approaches and iconography into drawing.

Required Materials

- *Masonite or plywood drawing board (at least 19"x25") with metal clips
- *Paper portfolio, at least 19"x25"
- *Toolbox, shoebox, or fabric bag to hold your supplies
- *18"x24" pad of white **drawing paper**
- *Unlined sketchbook, any size
- *1 sheet of grey drawing paper, 18" x 24" (Canson is best)
- *1 sheet of green drawing paper, 18" x 24" (Canson is best)

18"x24" pad of newsprint

*1 black Micron pen: 05 or 08
*2 compressed charcoal sticks

Drawing pencils: 2h, h, hb, 2b, 4b, and 6b (at least)

Small hand-held pencil sharpener

Vine charcoal

White 'charcoal' pencil or white conte

Small to medium set of **colored chalk pastels** (Alphacolor or Rembrandt, Rembrandt is better) Small set of **colored pencils** (please select Prismacolor or Derwent)

Spray fixative (I suggest you DON'T buy the brand Blair) Small bottle of **black ink Glue stick**

*Small glass or metal jar
Staedtler eraser or similar
2 grey kneadable erasers
Blending stump
2 inexpensive small watercolor brush

2 inexpensive, small, watercolor brushes: 1 flat and 1 round

Scissors

Ruler or long straight edge

You can purchase these supplies at Ellis Art or Michael's in Eureka, Art Center in Arcata, or online at Amazon or Blick.com.

You will need your supplies by Week 2. Class will end early on Week 1 so you will have time to collect all your supplies. Contact me right away if you are having any trouble getting your materials so we can figure out a solution.

You are also welcome to share supplies with another student. You and one or two other students can buy one set of supplies.

*However, every student must have their own of each of the *starred items.

Challenge yourself! I reward more difficult drawings with more points, even if they do not turn out as well. It is ok to take risks. I grade largely on effort and improvement, rather than how easily realistic drawing comes to you.

All assignments are graded using points and rubrics published on canvas. You may check your grades at any time. If you are unhappy with a grade you get on any assignment, you may review the rubric on Canvas to see why you got the grade you did. If you want to improve or correct your drawing you may do so and resubmit for a higher grade.

If you complete all the assignments, you will pass for sure. While I grade a little more generously when assignments are handed in on time, I do not deduct points for late assignments. I will accept missing assignments until the last day of class before finals week.

Keep tabs on your grades! I post all grades on Canvas. Occasionally I make mistakes. Email me right away if I missed something or if you have questions about your grades. We will work it out.

- 6. If safe to do so, notify key administrators, departments, and personnel.
- 7. Do not leave campus, unless it is necessary to preserve life and/or has been deemed safe by the person in command.
