Catalog Description

An introduction to the fundamentals for drawing the living human form. Concepts explored include gesture, contour, proportion, foreshortening, portraiture and anatomy. Students will also explore the expressive characteristics and narrative possibilities of figure drawing in both traditional and contemporary contexts.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Draw proficiently using a wide range of drawing materials and techniques, including graphite, charcoal, ink, pastel, and collage.
- 2. Create drawings that successfully demonstrate the expressive and experimental characteristics of line, value, composition, gesture, contour, proportion, foreshortening, Contrapposto, and anatomy.
- 3. Create drawings that successfully evaluate and respond to historical, contemporary, multicultural, and interdisciplinary materials, concepts, and approaches in figure drawing.
- 4. Evaluate and critically assess class projects and artworks presented in lectures, using relevant terminology in oral or written formats.

Prerequisites/co-requisites/ recommended preparation: Art 17 (Drawing) is recommended, but not required

Course Requirements: There will be 6+ <u>full</u> hours per week of lectures, demonstrations, critiques, and intensive art making. Your total involvement in each of these activities is absolutely required. In addition to in-class work, you'll need to spend approximately 2 hours per week outside of class watching the video lectures and demonstrations for each assignment. There will also be two group critiques during the semester, and you will be required to bring specific supplies to each class meeting. These supplies are listed in the calendar, on this syllabus, and on Canvas. Plenty of critical course information (including video lectures, video demonstrations, additional readings and grading rubrics) is located on our Canvas site, and you will be submitting your daily assignments through Canvas too. Access to a computer with internet is essential for this course, as is having a smart phone with a decent camera. Please see me if this is impossible for you.

How I Grade Your Assignments: When I evaluate your drawings, I am looking to see that your work satisfactorily reflects the Student Learning Outcomes listed for this course: in sum, that you are demonstrating understanding and proficiency with the drawing materials, techniques, and concepts that are covered in the lectures, demonstrations, and critiques in this class, and that you have spent the sufficient allocated time on each project. This means a minimum of 3 in-class hours of work spent on each drawing assignment, unless otherwise noted. If you must miss a class, you'll need to complete at least 3 hours of outside work per missed class. You also must show me your makeup work before it is submitted for grading, so I can make sure that you have done it correctly and that you have spent sufficient time on it to get full credit for it. You'll be submitting photos of your drawings at the end of each class period to the "Assignments" section on Canvas. I will give you points for each submission, and (in the process) Canvas will automatically calculate your overall grade in the "Grades" section. Feel free to check your grades there, and feel free to ask me about your grade and/or your progress in this class at any time.

Class Participation and Conduct: It is crucial to your grade that you show up to class with all your supplies, participate fully, and work diligently for the entire class period. You must also prepare for each class by watching each assigned video lecture and demonstration <u>before</u> each class meeting. Arriving late or leaving early from class will lower the points you receive for each drawing assignment. Chatting and/or not working during our

work sessions will also lower the points for each assignment. Be aware that if you miss more than 7 class sessions at any point during the semester, you will be dropped from this course for excessive absences and non-participation. I insist upon a professional and studious atmosphere in all my courses. If you consistently arrive late or leave early, chat during work sessions, distract other students, or somehow lower the concentration level of the classroom—you will be strongly discouraged from taking this course. This course is for serious students, but don't worry if you feel you have little skill at art. Give me

A note about in-class "Studio" hours: This is a face-to-face class with video lectures and video demonstrations that must be viewed at home before class. Your life drawings, however, <u>must be completed in class</u> under my direct supervision. Unless the entire course must switch to remote delivery due to a Covid-related or other emergency, *I* will <u>not</u> be giving you online advice about your work in this face-to-face course.

Bringing Supplies: No textbook is required for this course, but specific art materials are absolutely required. The supplies you will need each week are listed on the course calendar and described in the video demonstrations. You must bring the required art supplies to each class session, as I will not be providing materials. If you come to class empty-handed, you will be counted absent for that day. Also: do not mooch supplies off classmates! Please see me if you are missing a few items.

Conduct with Models: Your conduct toward the models shall always be courteous and professional. No comments should ever be made to the model about his or her appearance. Also: photography of any kind is strictly forbidden when the model is in session. Additionally: any online images and/or videos of models in this course shall never be copied or screen-grabbed or shared with anyone outside of our class.

Drawing pencils: F, 2B or HB, 4B

Small hand-held pencil sharpener

Soft vine charcoal, a handful

Compressed charcoal, 2 or 3 sticks

2 gray Kneadable erasers

1 white "Magic Rub" eraser

Drawing pen point and nib holder or Sakura Micron pen #05 (For your nib holder, Speed ball nib #B-6 is good, smaller nibs are optional)

Small bottle of black drawing ink (Do <u>not</u> purchase "Pro Art" brand India ink—it will clog your nib.)

1 inexpensive watercolor brush, about a #6 or a #8

1 inexpensive Haki flat wash brush, about a 1"

A small plastic palette

A paper or other portfolio, at least 19" x 25"

18" x 24" pad of white drawing paper

18" x 24" pad of rough newsprint

1 sheet of black drawing paper, 18" x 24" (Canson brand is best)

1 sheet of gray drawing paper, 18" x 24" (Canson brand is best)

1 sheet of colored drawing paper, 18" x 24" (The color of your choice--Canson brand is best)

A Masonite or plywood drawing board (at least 19"x25") and preferably with metal clips

1 roll of brown Kraft paper (aka Postal Wrap) 30" x 15' roll

Glassine paper (12 sheets of 18"x24" minimum dimension)

Tackle box, art box, shoebox, or cloth bag to hold your supplies

Small to medium set of colored soft pastels (Alphacolor is cheap, Rembrandt brand is better)

Soft black charcoal pencil

Soft white charcoal pencil

Soft black Conte crayon, 1 or 2 sticks

Soft white Conte crayon, 1 or 2 sticks

Soft brown Conte crayon, 1 or 2 sticks

1 medium sized container of white tempera paint (can be shared with another classmate)

Scissors

Glue stick

Collage items

Small to medium set of colored pencils (*Prismacolor* or *Derwent* brands) (optional)

iPad and Procreate (will be provided for in-class loan)
