Catalog Description

An introduction to history and practice of visual arts and architecture across time and diverse cultures. The course emphasizes theoretical approaches to examining artwork and the usage of art terminology. Methodologies include formal, material, symbolic, post-colonial, gender, and institutional critiques to provide students with multiple ways to respond to art and to develop a wide range of visual, verbal, and written lexicons.

Course Student Learning Outcomes (from course outline of record)

- 1. Evaluate and critique works of art and architecture based on formal elements and principles of design and employing appropriate art historical terminology.
- 2. Analyze, evaluate, and distinguish materials and techniques used for creating art and architecture
- 3. Apply different methods of art historical analysis, including formal, feminist and iconographic. Identify, analyze, and discuss the functions of art and architecture and the roles of artists in diverse cultures

No prior experience with art history is necessary, but it would be extremely helpful if you have completed at least one college-level English writing course.

Student Commitment: Your commitment will require at least as much time as you dedicate to a traditional class. Suggested time 3-6 hours per week depending on the week.

Computer Skills: Online courses require adequate computer skills. You must be able to:

- navigate the course Learning Management System (Canvas)
- •receive and respond to your CR email
- download and upload files to the Canvas, and
- •use a word processor (such as Microsoft Word)

It is your responsibility to meet the technological demands of the course


Technology Requirements: You should have high-speed internet (such as broadband) service from cable, DSL, or satellite providers as there are videos that require this speed. You need to have reliable access to the internet for the duration of the course. Anticipate problems with your computer and internet access (including power outages) by not waiting until the last minute to submit assignments. It is your responsibility to meet the class deadlines.

Portable Devices vs. Computers: Although you could use portable devices (such as Android or iOS phones & tablets) for some things, you should plan on doing the majority of your work (especially exams and assignments) from a reasonably newer notebook or desktop computer (Mac or PC). Do NOT plan to participate in this class solely from a portable device. If you do decide to use your portable device for some of your class work, use the free Canvas app (called "Canvas by Instructure") available in iTunes (for iOS) and the Google Play Store (for Android). Do not try to connect to Canvas using a web browser on a portable device. Your experience with Canvas will be a lot better using the app.

Required Textbook: "Gateways to Art," 3rd edition. Please make sure to get the 3rd edition, printed or etext is fine. Make sure to get the 3rd edition; there are too many differences in the other editions.

Evaluation & Grading Policy

For the entire semester, there will be **860 total possible points**, so you can check your progress by doing some simple math. Your final grade will be determined by adding the three following components:

- 1) Written Papers: (200 pts): There will be 2 written assignments, each worth 100 points. Specific information pertaining to assignment descriptions will be made available well in advance of the due-date. Papers submitted after the due date will be lowered one letter grade for each day they are late. Papers will not be accepted for grades if they are more than three days late. Papers will be checked for plagiarism using Turnitin plagiarism detection software.
- **2) Quizzes (180 pts.):** There will be 5 quizzes total (including the Final Exam), each will be worth 30 points. Quizzes will be administered online; they will cover material from the book, and additional information added by the instructor. Quizzes cannot be retaken or made up if missed.
- **3) Participation (480 pts.)**: There will be 16 Graded Discussions throughout the semester. You will receive up to 30 points for original postings and responses to other peoples' postings (reduced credit for superficial postings and responses). Topics will be announced at the beginning of the week and you will be required to participate before the end of the week. This is an important and required part of the class. **Lack of participation cannot be made up at a later date!.** The discussion assignments are accessed from the class homepage on Canvas. If you do not participate in a class discussion by the end of the second week of class, you may be dropped from the class.
