Catalog Description

An introduction to the elements and principles upon which two-dimensional art forms are structured. Concepts covered include line, shape, value, composition, space, texture, and color theory. Media used include drawing, painting, and collage.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Draw, paint, and collage proficiently using a wide range of two-dimensional art media and techniques, including graphite, ink, acrylic paint, and collage.
- 2. Create artworks that successfully demonstrate the expressive and experimental characteristics of line, shape, composition (including balance, unity, variety, focal point, and visual movement), as well as texture, value, color theory (including complementary contrast, simultaneous contrast, warm and cool colors, and color symbolism) and spatial illusion.
- 3. Create artworks that successfully evaluate and respond to historical, contemporary, multicultural, and interdisciplinary materials, concepts, and approaches in two-dimensional art forms.
- 4. Evaluate and critically assess class projects and artworks presented in lectures, using relevant terminology in oral or written formats.

How I Grade Your Assignments: When I evaluate your projects, I am looking to see that your work satisfactorily reflects the Student Learning Outcomes listed for this course: in sum, that you are demonstrating understanding and proficiency with the drawing, painting, collage, and digital materials, techniques, and concepts that are covered in the lectures, demonstrations, tutorials, bi-weekly discussions, and critiques in this class, and also that *you have spent the sufficient allocated time on each project*. Each Canvas Discussion, Assignment, Lecture, Demonstration, and Project Description has plenty of additional information to help you complete each assignment successfully.

Please Note: You must follow along with each assignment in a sequential manner, because each assignment is carefully designed to follow the previous one. *I will not grade work that is completed out of order*. Also: all assignments (lectures, quizzes, demonstrations, and posts) have *specific due dates*, and if you fall behind on these due dates *you will fall out of sync with your classmates and lose out on their camaraderie and assistance*. Any work not completed by Sunday night of each week will receive zero points. You can make up missed work to make up the lost points, but falling behind will make this course much more difficult to successfully complete. Canvas will automatically calculate your overall grade in the "Grades" section after I grade each submission. Feel free to check your grades there, and feel free to ask me about your grade and/or your progress in this class at any time. There are many things to do, and we move quickly—just like we would in a face-to-face class. This course is for serious students, but don't worry if you feel you have little skill at art. *Carefully follow along with each assignment, complete each assignment on schedule, be willing to do your best, and you should have no problem succeeding in this course!*

Course Requirements

Expect to spend 6+ hours each week watching recorded lectures and demonstrations, following along with my advice in Discussions and critiques, and making plenty of cool artworks. You are required to post high-resolution photographs of your in-progress and completed projects at least twice each week by the specified due dates. You must also have a home workspace to complete your projects (I will show you how to set up your workspace the first week of class) and must purchase specific art supplies (see below). Throughout the semester, you will also take 7 quizzes that are based on the lectures that accompany each project. There are also 3 scheduled group critiques throughout the semester.

A Note About Discussions: You are most welcome to give your classmates helpful commentary and "likes" in our Discussions, but unless they are one of our three Critique Discussions, you are not required to comment on your classmates' work in these bi-weekly forums. These Discussions are designed to approximate the informal and spontaneous experience of face-to-face classroom interactions. Because of this, do not say anything to a classmate in these Discussions that you wouldn't say to them in person. *All interactions between students shall be helpful and constructive*. If you have a comment or concern that is of a more sensitive nature, please direct it only to me.

A Note About Critiques: There are three scheduled critiques (at Week 7, Week 12, and Week 16), and your participation in these critiques is required. The critiques will be held on Zoom as live (synchronous) events (dates and times TBD). If you cannot attend these Zoom critiques, I will provide an alternative asynchronous Critique Discussion for you to get formalized feedback from your classmates. I will schedule the Zoom critiques at a time when most of you can attend, and by all means please try to attend them! They are fun and packed with encouraging and useful information. These live critiques also foster a sense of community in this class.

3. <u>Mediums</u> :	Small bottle of Acrylic Gloss Medium or Slow Dry Acrylic Glazing Medium

4. <u>Brushes</u>: A set of watercolor or acrylic brushes: 1 flat about 3/4" wide, one round about 1/4" wide, and a good quality very fine detail brush (about size #0 or #1)
5. <u>Other Supplies</u>: Five 15"x20" illustration boards, *vellum* finish preferred 1 sheet of heavy weight Bristol Board, *vellum* finish (9"x12")

9"x12" sketch pad or scratch paper

9"x12" tracing paper, a couple of sheets

An enamel butcher tray or disposable palette

A cup for water

An 18" T-Square ruler

Scissors or (preferably) Exacto-blade and blade holder

Glue stick
