Catalog Description

A beginning level course that introduces students to a variety of concepts for visual literacy and visual expression in drawing: including line, composition, value, color, space, and perspective. Media used includes graphite, charcoal, ink, pastel, and collage.

- 1. Draw proficiently using a wide range of technical materials and techniques, including graphite, charcoal, ink, pastel, and collage.
- Create drawings that successfully demonstrate the expressive and experimental characteristics of line, composition, value, texture, and spatial illusion, including linear and atmospheric perspective.
- 3. Create drawings that successfully evaluate and respond to historical, contemporary, multicultural, and interdisciplinary materials, concepts, and approaches in drawing.
- 4. Evaluate and critically assess class projects and artworks presented in lectures using relevant terminology in oral or written formats

Toolbox, shoebox, or fabric bag to hold your supplies
Spray fixative (I strongly suggest you DON'T buy the brand Blair)
Small bottle of black ink
Staedtler eraser or similar
2 grey kneadable erasers
Blending stump
2 inexpensive, small, watercolor brushes: 1 flat and 1 round
Long Ruler or straight edge
Small glass or metal jar

You can purchase these supplies at Michael's, Ellis Art in Eureka, Art Center in Arcata, or online at Amazon or Blick.com. You will need your supplies by Week 3 at the very latest, which should give you enough time for shipping. Contact me right away if you are having any trouble collecting your supplies so we can figure out a solution.

*You are also welcome to share supplies with another student. You and one or two other students can buy one set of supplies, However, every student must have their own of each of the *starred* items.*

Evaluation & Grading Policy

Challenge yourself! I reward more difficult drawings with more points, even if they do not turn out as well. It is ok to take risks. I grade largely on effort and improvement, rather than how easily realistic drawing comes to you.

All assignments are graded using points and rubrics published on canvas. If you complete all of the assignments, you will pass for sure. While I grade a little more generously when assignments are handed in on time, I do not deduct points for late assignments. I will accept missing assignments until the last day of class before finals week.

If you are unhappy with a grade you get on any assignment, you may review the rubric on Canvas to see why you got the grade you did. If you want to improve or correct your drawing you may do so and resubmit for a higher grade.

Attendance Policy

Attendance is very important for this kind of class. You need to be here to learn and to get feedback. I am not assigning any homework for this class, so how you use your time in class really matters. You must use all your time in class to do work, and you must show up.

You will receive points for your participation in class, this includes your comments in discussion and critiques, your active listening, and how you use your time.

- 2. In the event of an emergency, the responsible district employee on scene will:
 - a. Follow established procedures for the specific emergency as outlined in the College of the Redwoods Emergency Procedure Booklet.
 - b. Lock all doors and turn off lights if in lockdown due to an active shooter or similar emergency. c. Close all window curtains.
 - d. Get all inside to safe location Kitchen area is best internal location.
 - e. If a police officer or higher official arrives, they will assume command.
 - f. Wait until notice of all is clear before unlocking doors.
 - g. If safe to do so, move to the nearest evacuation point outside building (Pooky's Park), directly behind the Hoopa Tribal Education Building.
 - h. Do not leave site, unless it has been deemed safe by the person in command. Student Support Services (required for online classes)
