Thank you for choosing this section of Art 4, Art Appreciation! My name is Shannon Sullivan and I will be your instructor for this course. I've been teaching at CR in the Art Department for 15 years and I love it! Thank you for joining in the fun. Students take this course for many reasons including GE transfer credit, Humanities elective credit, and personal enrichment. This course covers an incredible array of information about making and looking at art throughout the ages. The material is the perfect combination of intriguing and challenging.

Course delivery: This course is delivered and taught 100% online; there are no classroom meetings and no proctored exams.

Catalog Description

An introduction to history and practice of visual arts and architecture across time and diverse cultures. The course emphasizes theoretical approaches to examining artwork and the usage of art terminology. Methodologies include formal, material, symbolic, post-colonial, gender, and institutional critiques to provide students with multiple ways to respond to art and to develop a wide range of visual, verbal, and written lexicons.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Evaluate and critique works of art and architecture based on formal elements and principles of design and employing appropriate art historical terminology.
- 2. Analyze, evaluate, and distinguish materials and techniques used for creating art and architecture
- 3. Apply different methods of art historical analysis, including formal, feminist and iconographic.
- 4. Identify, analyze, and discuss the functions of art and architecture and the roles of artists in diverse cultures

We're going to ask questions like 'What is the purpose of art?', 'Why are we humans attracted to certain patterns and images?' and 'How does art continue to change and evolve?' 'What does being an artist entail in different times and cultures?' This introductory course will help you answer some of these questions and teach you how to ask new ones. It will introduce you to the history and practice of visual arts across time and

diverse cultures. The goal is to experience art from multiple angles and to develop a vocabulary to describe diverse works of art.

No prior experience with art history is necessary, but it would be extremely helpful if you have successfully completed at least one college-level English writing course.

Student Commitment: Your commitment will require at least as much time as you dedicate to a traditional class. Suggested time is 3-6 hours per week depending on the week.

Skills needed include:

- •carefully read online lectures and textbook chapters
- •participate in online activities and watch online videos
- •participate in online discussions, and
- •complete weekly quizzes. Conscientiousness, attention to details, and skills in reading and writing are critical for success.

Q: Will there be a lot of writing?

A: Not an unreasonable amount. But, since the class is online, strong reading and writing skills are essential.

Computer Skills: Online courses require adequate computer skills. You must be able to:

- •navigate the course Learning Management System (Canvas)
- •receive and respond to your CR email
- •download and upload files to the Canvas, and
- •use a word processor (such as Microsoft Word)

It is your responsibility to meet the technological demands of the course


If you need help with any of these things, please let me know and we'll hook you up with assistance!

Technology Requirements: You should have high-speed internet (such as broadband) service from cable, DSL, or satellite providers as there are videos that require this speed. You need to have reliable access to the internet for the duration of the course. Anticipate problems with your computer and internet access (including power outages) by not waiting until the last minute to submit assignments. It is your responsibility to meet the class deadlines.

- **React analytically** to the topic, not a summary

- **Post before** the deadline
- Meet the 200-300 word minimum length, post the required photos

Classmate Replies -- 20 points possible (10 each) – Your reply posts must:

- **React thoughtfully** to the content of two classmates' primary replies. Focus your reply on your classmate's post, not on your personal experiences
- **Meet** the 100 word minimum length
- Use correct grammar, spelling, punctuation, and complete sentences
