Thank you for choosing this section of Art 31A-Introduction to Ceramics (Hand Building). My name is Shannon Sullivan and I will be your instructor for this course. I've been teaching at CR in the Art Department for 15 years and I love it! Students take this course for many reasons including as an elective for the Associates Degree for Transfer (ADT) in Studio Arts, as an elective for the Liberal Arts: Fine Arts Associates Degree, as a Humanities elective credit, and for personal enrichment. If you have questions about why you are taking this class, let me know.

Course delivery: This semester the course is being taught in a hybrid modality, some call it "a flipped classroom". That means some of the class is online, and some is face-to-face. We meet face-to -face to do the lab component of the course together every week on Mondays and Wednesdays. For homework, you'll do the online portion of the class which consists of lectures and demonstrations that are in pre-recorded video, pictorial, or written format.

Here's what the typical weekly flow looks like:

- 1. New content is released on Wednesdays after class for the following week.
- 2. Expect the online content to take you 2-3 hours each week. Plan for that, because it's not optional ©
- 3. Asynchronously, you work your way through the online content and take the weekly understanding quiz before Monday's lab session. Quizzes are due at 11:59pm on Sundays. Quizzes are usually between 6-10 questions and assess understanding of the module content that week.
- 4. Come to lab with questions, discussion drawings (when required), and always be ready to work in the studio during lab time.
- 5. Take notes during the videos to inform your lab questions. Rewind, watch them again. Please use them to their fullest potential.

Here's what to expect the first week:

1. The online component of the class starts on Saturday, January 15. Be sure to log in and get started on Saturday. Our first face-to-face is Wednesday, January 19. The first two weeks are very video intensive. Be prepared for that.

When on campus, students, faculty, and staff will be required to wear masks over their mouth and nose at all times and follow distancing/sanitation protocols

Catalog Description

An introductory course designed to expose students to the fundamental construction methods and processes of working with clay. In addition, this course is designed to introduce students to ceramic vocabulary as well as glazing and firing techniques.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Build proficiently with a variety of hand-building techniques.
- 2. Discuss orally and in writing the themes, content, issues, and skills used to make ceramic objects, installations, and experimental artworks.
- 3. Research contemporary and historical artists from across the globe working with traditional and non-traditional ceramic techniques and processes.
- 4. Research a variety of glaze and alternative surfacing applications.

Prerequisites/co-requisites/recommended preparation

Art-11, Three-Dimensional Design, introduces students to the basic principles of working with materials, making objects, and designing in the round. Students who have taken 3D Design, or an equivalent course or have equivalent experience, will be more prepared to take on the conceptual rigor and design objectives of Art 31A.

No prior experience with ceramics is necessary. That said, some familiarity with the basic properties of clay would be very helpful. To succeed in this class you need tenacity, the ability to focus for long stretches of time, and a genuine desire to learn to work with clay.

Student Commitment:

Your commitment will require at least as much time as you dedicate to a traditional class. Suggested time 3-8 hours per week depending on the week.

Skills needed include:

- carefully read and watch online lectures and demonstrations
- participate in online activities and watch online videos
- participate in online discussions
- complete quizzes
- complete studio assignments using hand building techniques
- photograph own artwork, upload photos to Canvas

Conscientiousness, attention to details, and skills in reading and writing are critical for success.

Q: Will there be a lot of writing?

A: Not an unreasonable amount. Most of the class is online, so strong reading and writing skills are essential.

Computer Skills: Online courses require adequate computer skills. You must be able to:

- navigate the course Learning Management System (Canvas)
- receive and respond to your CR email
- download and upload files to the Canvas, and
- use a word processor (such as Microsoft Word)

It is your responsibility to meet the technological demands of the course

If you need help with any of these things, please let me know and we'll hook you up with assistance! **Technology Requirements**:

You should have high-speed internet (such as broadband) service from cable, DSL, or satellite providers as there are videos that require this speed. You need to have reliable access to the internet for the duration of the course. Anticipate problems with your computer and internet access (including power outages) by not waiting until the last minute to submit assignments. It is your responsibility to meet the class deadlines.

Portable Devices vs. Computers: Although you could use portable devices (such as Android or iOS phones & tablets) for some things, you should plan on doing the majority of your work (especially exams and assignments) from a reasonably newer notebook or desktop computer (Mac or PC). Do NOT plan to participate in this class solely from a portable device. If you do decide to use your portable device for some of your class work, use the free Canvas app (called "Canvas by Instructure") available in iTunes (for iOS) and the Google Play Store (for Android). Do not try to connect to Canvas using a web browser on a portable device. Your experience with Canvas will be a lot better using the app.

Students Must Provide:

- Reliable internet connection
- A bamboo brush for applying underglaze-available at Ellis Art and Engineering (Eureka), The Art Center (Arcata), or Phoenix Ceramics (Arcata)
- Beginning Pottery Tool Kit and other materials listed on supply graphic (look in this module)
- 2 X10" dowel rollers. One .5" thick, one 1.5" thick.
- Safe workspace for working on projects (week 1 will discuss this in detail)
- Plastic to cover works in progress. Think large sheets of plastic or even store your work in a Rubbermaid tub to keep it from getting hard.
- A tub or sturdy cardboard box to transport your work to CR if you choose to take your work home. You
 are responsible for your work arriving safely. I suggest an extra snug setup for transportation. No loose
 wares in boxes. One quick stop and your work is in shards. Put your pieces in boxes padded with

bubble wrap, soft fabric, or soft crinkled paper. Then strap the boxes into your vehicle with the seatbelt, securely on the floor, or secured with a strap so they stay still even if you go up a hill, go over a bump, etc...

- Work will be evaluated using a published rubric and/or self-evaluation/inventory form.

Sample Discussion: 50 points

Late Discussion Posts: Not accepted.

Find the relevant discussions in the weekly Canvas modules.

Primary post -- 30 points possible -- Your primary reply must:

- **React analytically** to the topic, not a summary
- Relate and apply topic to your own personal experience
- **Use** correct grammar, spelling, punctuation, and complete sentences
- **Post before** the deadline
- **Meet** the 200 word minimum length, post the required photos

Classmate Replies -- 20 points possible (10 each) - Your reply posts must:

- **React thoughtfully** to the content of two classmates' primary replies. Focus your reply on your classmate's post, not on your personal experiences
- **Meet** the 100 word minimum length
- **Use** correct grammar, spelling, punctuation, and complete sentences

Sample Studio Project: 100 points

Late Studio Projects: Accepted with 20 points deducted for each drop off deadline missed.

The objectives differ from project to project. Below are the categories I grade on for each project. Additional categories may be added for the particulars of the project.

- **Structure** Works demonstrate even, compressed floor and walls. Thickness is approximately 1/4". Scale requirements were met.
- Considered Form and Ideas Pieces meet the formal goals for the project in a way that's thoughtful, unique or inventive.
- **Effort and Improvement** Project demonstrates attention and progress appropriate to the amount of time allocated. Improvement in technique since the previous assignment.
- **Exceptional Craft** Project demonstrates exemplary attention to detail and a commitment to the ceramic process. Piece is finished in the round.
- Turned in On Time.

Sample Preparatory Sketches: 10 points

Late Policy: Accepted with 2 points deducted per day it's late.

- One Drawing Per Piece (minimum) Make at least one drawing for each piece that is due. Your drawings can use any media and can be done in the sketchbook or digitally in a computer-based drawing program if you prefer. This is not a drawing class, and I don't expect that you've taken one. Just draw. It's important to practice thinking from 2D →3D →2D and back again. Your 3D work will be infinitely stronger if you practice drawing.
- **Use your sketchbook to record ideas in your favorite way.** These don't need to be finished drawings ready to frame. No need to include color (if that's not your thing). Use notes, lists, clippings, photos, or anything else that helps you communicate your ideas. All of your drawings will be photographed and uploaded for review.
- Turned in on Time

Sample Critique Objectives:

Late Policy: Not Accepted. Our critiques will happen in small groups during our on-campus meetings.

- Discuss the meaning, feeling, and ideas of the work being presented
- Discuss the process used to create the work being presented
- Discuss areas that could be improved and areas that are working well as is.

Quizzes:

Late Policy: One Day Grace Period

Letter Grades will be assigned. Here's my grading scale.

A—Excellent Work: requirements for the course have been more than fulfilled, and the work has been developed beyond previous levels on both an aesthetic and a conceptual basis. Artwork shows excellent intellectual skills and ideas, technical skills and craft, and control of the medium. Student exhibits excellent class participation. (93-100=A, 90-93+A-)

B—Very Good Work: The art work, its presentation, and the student's class participation shows competence in skill development, craft, and control of the medium. Completed work shows an understanding of conceptual concerns in the context of ceramics. (87-89=B+, 84-86=B, 80-83=B-)

C—Average Work: Satisfactory work quality. Requirements for the course have been fulfilled adequately. The student has been present with completed work on critique days and for individual appointments. Class participation is adequate. (77-79=C+, 70-76=C)

D—Poor Work: Requirements for the course are not adequately fulfilled. (60-69=D)

F—Failure: No attempt has been made to fulfill requirements of the course. (59 or below)

 - **A.** No. That would take up too much kiln space and you won't have time to glaze all of the pieced during our limited allocated time on campus for glazing.
