Catalog Description

A beginning level course that introduces students to a variety of concepts for visual expression and visual literacy in drawing: including line, composition, value, color, space, and perspective. Mediums include graphite, charcoal, ink, pastel, digital techniques, and collage.

- 1. Draw proficiently using a wide range of technical materials and techniques, including graphite, charcoal, ink, pastel, digital techniques, and collage.
- 2. Create drawings that successfully demonstrate the expressive and experimental characteristics of line, composition, value, texture, and spatial illusion, including linear and atmospheric perspective.
- 3. Create drawings that successfully evaluate and respond to historical, contemporary, multicultural, and interdisciplinary materials, concepts, and approaches in drawing.
- 4. Evaluate and critically assess class projects and artworks presented in lectures using relevant terminology in oral or written formats.

Plenty of critical course information (including quizzes, reading assignments, grading posts and grading rubrics) is located on our Canvas site, and you will be submitting your daily assignments through Canvas too. Access to a computer with internet is essential for this course, as is having a smart phone with a decent camera. Please see me if this is impossible for you.

How I Grade Your Assignments: When I evaluate your drawings, I am looking to see that your work satisfactorily reflects the Student Learning Outcomes listed for this course: in sum, that you are demonstrating understanding and proficiency with the drawing materials, techniques, and concepts that are covered in the lectures, demonstrations, and critiques in this class, and that you have spent the sufficient allocated time on each project. This means a minimum of 3 in-class hours of work spent on each drawing assignment, unless otherwise noted. If you must miss a class, you'll need to complete at least 3 hours of outside work per missed class. You also must show me your makeup work before it is submitted for grading, so I can make sure that you have done it correctly and that you have spent sufficient time on it to get full credit for it. You'll be submitting photos of your drawings at the end of each class period to the "Assignments" section on Canvas. I will give you points for each submission, and (in the process) Canvas will automatically calculate your overall grade in the "Grades" section. Feel free to check your grades there, and feel free to ask me about your grade and/or your progress in this class at any time.

Class Participation and Conduct: It is crucial to your grade that you show up to class with all your supplies, participate fully, and work diligently for the entire class period. Arriving late or leaving early from class will lower the points you receive for each drawing assignment. Chatting and/or not working during our work sessions will also lower the points for each assignment. Be aware that if you miss more than 7 class sessions at any point during

the semester, you will be dropped from this course for excessive absences and non-participation. I insist upon a professional and studious atmosphere in all my courses. If you consistently arrive late or leave early, chat during work sessions, distract other students, or somehow lower the concentration level of the classroom—you will be strongly discouraged from taking this course. This course is for serious students, but don't worry if you feel you have little skill at art. Give me 100% of your involvement, be willing to do your best, and you should have no problem succeeding in this course!

Bringing Supplies: No textbook is required for this course, but specific art materials are absolutely required. The supplies you will need each week are listed on the course calendar. You must bring the required art supplies to each class session, as I will not be providing materials. If you come to class empty-handed, you will be counted absent for that day. Also: do not mooch supplies off classmates! Please see me if you are missing a few items.

It is crucial to your grade that you show up with all your supplies, participate fully, and work diligently for the entire class period.

Soft vine charcoal, a handful

Drawing pencils: 2B and 4B (Tombow, Derwent, Staedtler, or Faber-Castell brands)

Small hand-held pencil sharpener

1 White Magic Rub eraser

2 Grey kneadable erasers

18"x24" pad of white drawing paper (Strathmore 400 series drawing, regular surface is good)

18"x24" pad of rough newsprint

A Masonite or plywood drawing board (at least 19"x25") and metal clips

Paper portfolio, at least 19"x25"

Toolbox, shoebox, or fabric bag to hold your supplies

Drawing pen point and nib holder or *Sakura Micron* pen #05 (If you choose a nib holder, *Speedball* nib #B-6 is good, smaller nibs are optional.)

Small bottle of black drawing ink (Please do not purchase "Pro Art" brand India ink—it will clog your nib.)

2 inexpensive watercolor brushes - one camel hair (or nylon or sabeline, about a #6 or #8)

One 1" haki flat wash brush

A small paper or plastic cup

Compressed charcoal, 2 sticks (Alphacolor by Weber is good)

Small set of colored chalk pastels (Alphacolor is inexpensive, or Rembrandt brand, which is better)

Scissors

Glue stick

Several sheets of colored construction paper or gift wrap paper, at least 9"x12"

18" or 24" T-Square ruler

Black charcoal pencil

White charcoal pencil

1 sheet of grey drawing paper, 18" x 24" (Canson brand is best)

1 sheet of green drawing paper, 18" x 24" (Canson brand is best)

1 sheet of the color of your choice Canson drawing paper, 18" x 24"

Glassine paper, 10 sheets of 18"x24" minimum dimension

A small set of colored pencils (please select *Prismacolor* or *Derwent*) (optional)

Conte pastel pencil set (optional)

An iPad with Procreate (iPads will be provided for in-class use)
