Catalog Description

A course that introduces the fundamentals for oil and acrylic painting, including value, color, composition, space, impasto, and glazing techniques. This course presents both traditional and contemporary techniques and approaches.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Demonstrate proficiency with a wide range of materials and techniques, including mixing, blending, proper use of tools and mediums, proper substrate preparation, color mixing, and basic color theory.
- 2. Create paintings that successfully demonstrate the expressive and experimental characteristics of line, value, composition, space, impasto, glazing, and the spatial, emotive, and symbolic properties of color.
- 3. Create paintings that successfully evaluate and respond to historical, contemporary, multicultural, and interdisciplinary materials, concepts, and approaches in painting.
- 4. Evaluate and critically assess class projects and artworks presented in lectures using relevant terminology in oral or written formats.

Prerequisites/co-requisites/ recommended preparation: Art 10 and/or Art 17 is recommended but not required.

Course Requirements: There will be 6+ <u>full</u> hours per week of lectures, demonstrations, critiques, and intensive art making. Your involvement in each of these activities is absolutely required. In addition to in-class work, you'll need to spend approximately 2 hours per week outside of class watching video demonstrations and taking quizzes for each painting project. You are also required to bring specific supplies to each class meeting; these supplies are listed on this syllabus (see below) and described in the video demonstrations. There are two group critiques (on Zoom) during the semester. There are also six quizzes (on Canvas) to take for each project, and two short research projects (on Canvas) to complete. Plenty of critical course information (including video demonstrations, reading

assignments, grading posts, and grading rubrics) is located on our Canvas site, and you will be submitting your daily assignments through Canvas too. Access to a computer with internet is essential for this course, as is having a smart phone with a decent camera. Please see me if this is impossible for you.

How I Grade Your Assignments: When I evaluate your work, I am looking to see that your work satisfactorily reflects the Student Learning Outcomes listed for this course: in sum, that you are demonstrating understanding and proficiency with the painting materials, techniques, and concepts that are covered in the lectures, demonstrations, and critiques in this class, and also that you have spent the sufficient allocated time on each project. If you must miss a class, you'll need to complete at least 3 hours of outside work per missed class. You also must show me your makeup work before it is submitted for grading, so I can make sure that you have done it correctly and that you have spent sufficient time on it to get full credit for it. You'll be submitting your in-progress and completed projects at the end of each class period to the "Assignments" section on Canvas. I will give you points for each submission, and (in the process) Canvas will automatically calculate your overall grade in the "Grades" section. Feel free to check your grades there, and feel free to ask me about your grade and/or your progress in this class at any time.

Class Participation and Conduct: It is absolutely crucial to your grade that you show up to class with all your supplies, participate fully, and work diligently for the entire class period. Arriving late or leaving early from class

will lower the points you receive for each assignment. Chatting and/or not working during our work sessions will also lower the points for each assignment. Be aware that if you miss more than 7 class sessions at any point during the semester, you will be dropped from this course for excessive absences and non-participation. I insist upon a professional and studious atmosphere in all my courses. If you consistently arrive late or leave early, chat during our work sessions, distract other students, or somehow lower the concentration level of the classroom—you will be strongly discouraged from taking this

course. This course is for serious students, but don't worry if you feel you have little skill at art. Give me 100% of your involvement, be willing to do your best, and you should have no problem succeeding in this course!

Bringing Supplies: No textbook is required for this course, but specific art materials are absolutely required. **You must bring the required art supplies to each class session**, as I will not be providing materials. If you come to class empty-handed, you will be counted absent for that day. Also: do not mooch supplies off classmates! Please see me if you are missing a few items.

A note about in-class "Studio" hours: This is a face-to-face class with video demonstrations that must be viewed at home before class. Your paintings, however, <u>must be completed in class</u> under my direct supervision. Unless the entire course must switch to remote delivery due to a Covid-related or other emergency, *I will <u>not</u> be giving you online advice about your work in this face-to-face course*.

MATERIALS LIST FOR ART 23

1. Drawing Supplies: 2B drawing pencil

Soft vine charcoal, one stick

Kneadable eraser

2. Paints (oil, water soluble oil, acrylic, or open acrylic):

Azo, Hansa, or Cadmium Yellow Light Ultramarine Blue (preferably red shade) Pthalo blue (preferably green shade)

Quinacridone red (or other cool magenta Red) Burnt Sienna or Quinacridone Nickel Azo Gold

Ivory or Mars black

Titanium or Titanium-Zinc white

3. <u>Mediums</u>: <u>For acrylic</u>:

Acrylic gloss medium or slow dry "Open" acrylic glazing medium and Acrylic gel medium, small jar

For oil (option #1):

Galkyd, medium container and Gamsol, medium container Gamblin Cold Wax Medium (small jar)

For oil (option #2):

Stand Oil, small container and Damar Varnish, small container and Gamsol or turpentine, medium container Gamblin Cold Wax Medium (small jar)

For oil (water soluble option #3):

Water soluble oil painting medium or Slow dry acrylic glazing medium Acrylic gel medium, small jar

4. Brushes:

A set of good quality <u>boar bristle</u> (*not* nylon) brushes (blond-colored bristles, long handles) 2 flats or filberts, one of them about 1" wide and the other about 1/2" wide, and one small round, approx. 1/4" wide. If you already have oil or acrylic brushes at home, just bring those in regardless of their size. Also, you will need a good quality very fine <u>detail brush</u>: (preferably sable or nylon, about size #0 or #1).

5. Other Supplies:

Palette knife Bar of soap

A cellulose (kitchen) sponge

A big coffee can or plastic yogurt container Canvas bag or toolbox to hold your supplies

Rags or a roll of paper towels

For oil painters: 2 small glass jars with sealing lids.

<u>A Palette</u>: A lightweight plastic, wood, or Masonite palette, or a disposable paper palette pad. A palette with a sealing lid is helpful for transporting to and from class.

6. Painting Boards:

Ready to paint upon stretchers or canvas boards about 16"x20 to 18"x24" in size, one for each painting project (you'll need 5-6 for the entire semester). You'll also have the opportunity to make your own stretched canvases for painting on, and I'll tell you what materials you'll need for this before our stretcher bar demonstration.

Please note: some supplies may need to be periodically replenished throughout the semester.



Best brands of acrylic paint: Golden, Golden Open, or Liquitex Professional grade
