Catalog Description

Cinema 3 is a survey course dealing with cinema from Asia, Africa, and Latin America. We will survey a variety of approaches academics use to analyze cinema including, but not limited to: genre study; auteurism; aesthetics; economics; social, cultural, and historical context; and some film theory. Students will also gain an understanding of larger themes associated with the development of world cinema.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Identify and analyze subtle and complex meanings of a film's (or films') stylistic elements and place those in its (their) historical, cultural, political, industrial, authorial, and/or national context(s) where appropriate.
- 2. Apply film theories and arguments in the field to analyze non-verbal communication in visual imagery.
- 3. Read and decode cinematic language to extract meaning by identifying artistic and authorial choices that went into a film's construction.

Nonparticipation policy

If you have failed to log in to Canvas and/or failed to submit a response for 50 percent or more of weekly assignments by the class's census date (01/30/23), you will be automatically dropped from the class for nonparticipation.

Late assignments policy:

Assignments will be submitted on Canvas. Assignments that are submitted late will have 10% of total points deducted for every week they are overdue. Assignment submitted less than or equal to 1 week overdue = 10 points detracted; submitted less than or equal to 2 weeks overdue = 20 points detracted, and so on. Assignments submitted 5 or more weeks' late will be accepted for a score of 50%.

Exams

The three exams in this class will be taken on Canvas. Sections will be timed. Questions include image identification, multiple choice, visual analysis, and short essay responses. A study guide will be circulated prior to each exam. Exams are not cumulative.

Exam make-up

Contributing to the discussion forum

Each week you will contribute to an online discussion forum and respond to one of your classmates' posts. Primary posts are worth 7 points; response posts are worth 3 points for a weekly total of ten possible points. There will be 15 discussion questions for a total of 150 points.

Content Advisory
