Catalog Description

A second semester course in advanced cabinetmaking. Participants work on cabinets of their own design and choice while expanding upon topics covered in Cabinetmaking III. Topics include: 20th and 21st century cabinet history and design, job safety analysis, advanced machinery set-up and techniques, wood bending, wood turning, laminating, inlay, dyeing, coloring and finishing, laser engraving and cabinet installation.

Course Student Learning Outcomes (from course outline of record)

- 1. Identify furniture and cabinet styles from the 20th and 21st century.
- 2. Construct cabinets that are advanced in scope and complexity.
- 3. Research and present safety topics related to the secondary wood products industry.

Prerequisites/co-requisites: CT-57C Cabinetmaking and Millwork III

All students wishing to take CR cabinetmaking classes, regardless of prior experience, are required to start with CT-57A. This ensures that you become familiar with the safety practices of the CR woodshop and learn the proper operation of its power equipment as well as the location and organization methods used for the countless small wood tools that are available.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

As a student cabinetmaker in CT-57D you are required to attend lectures, participate in labs in which the class will build cabinets for the student-built house, read the text assignments and engage yourself fully in the tests, quizzes and assignments.

Course Skills: This course will focus on the following cabinetmaking skills:

- 1. Review plans and specifications to determine project requirements.
- 2. Select materials and equipment required to meet job specifications.
- 3. Generate a cutting list to determine material needs.
- 4. Develop a schedule that coordinates cabinet construction.
- 5. Select materials to match color, grain and texture.
- 6. Examine materials to identify defects and eliminate unusable pieces.
- 7. Cut materials to dimensions or angles according to the cut list.
- 8. Create jigs or templates for specialty items.
- 9. Fabricate cabinetry using acceptable joining methods.
- 10. Fabricate cabinetry taking into account wood movement.
- 11. Procure and handle raw and finished products in a protected manner
- 12. Wear and use personal protective equipment to prevent accidents and damage to health.

- 13. Maintain a clean and orderly work area.
- 14. Operate tools and equipment according to safety instructions.
- 15. Review trade journals and periodicals

Class Format: Lecture/ lab

Lectures: The lecture period will be from 12:40 - 1:45pm every Wednesday. Lab: The lab period will be from 1:50-5:00pm every working day. It is important to apply yourself to the task at hand, and use your lab time to make progress each day. Use your time wisely, and stay busy. As in industry "down time is clean-up time."

Lectures: The lecture period will be from 12:40 - 1:45 pm every Wednesday. During the first few class meetings the lectures will be two to three hours long because we will be reviewing machine tool operation and safety. Make every effort to attend these lectures as it will be almost impossible to make them up.

Lab:

The lab period will be from 1:50-5:00 pm every working day. It is important to apply yourself to the task at hand, and use our lab time to make progress each and every day. Use your time wisely, and stay busy. As in industry "down time is clean-up time". Always check-out with the instructor prior to leaving.

Cabinet Work and Projects:

Students in CT-57D are required to work on advanced cabinet projects intended for the student project house. This work will incorporate the skills gained in CT-57 A, B and C. Personal choice projects are at the discretion of the instructor and must be approved. All assigned work must be completed first.

No unauthorized projects!

<u>Participation</u>: Completing this semester's cabinet work will require participation from all student cabinetmakers. Just as at work, <u>on-time arrival and full participation in class is expected of all students</u>. A portion of the lab time will be spent at the student-built project house installing cabinets. You will be responsible for your own transportation.

<u>Clean Up</u>: Shop and jobsite clean-up is part of every cabinetmaker's responsibility. A well organized and clean shop is generally a reflection of the high-quality work accomplished in that facility.

<u>Work Habits</u>: Safety, initiative, punctuality, sobriety, teamwork, effort, and attitude. Check out with your instructor prior to leaving class.

Homework: Reading and homework assignments will be given. Check the class schedule for assignments and due dates. Read prior to the lecture. All students must complete a technical report and an oral presentation based upon the review of a trade journal. **This assignment must be word processed and presented to the class.**

Tests and Quizzes: Safety tests will be given prior to students using any tools or machinery in the lab. Quizzes will be given periodically on lecture and reading topics. Additionally, <u>"exit quizzes"</u> will be given on important topics of the day. All quizzes must be taken in class and cannot be made up.

Project Materials: The college will provide all materials needed for assigned projects. Safety glasses, pencils, notebook, and tape measure are required of all students. Personal protective equipment such as particle masks, ear muffs, etc. are up to the individual student to provide.

Final Exam: Final exam will consist of a written exam covering lecture and lab topics. Additionally, all students are expected to participate in end of the semester clean up and shop maintenance.

Final Exam: Monday May 6th, 2024 2:00 - 4:00 pm

Students in all classes are expected to attend and participate in the final assessment at the end of the semester. This includes a project review and written final. The final exam will consist of two parts, an in-class lab portion and an online written portion. Prior arrangements must be made with the instructor if for any reason you are unable to attend the final. Non-emergency excuse for absence on final day results in loss of one full course grade

<u>Grading/Evaluation</u>: Grades are part of the teaching and learning process. Keep in mind that you earn grades; I do not "give" them to you. I will assess your work according to how well it meets class objectives, fulfills requirements, meets the assignment rubric, and reflects the academic skills expected of college students. It is your responsibility to understand why you have achieved a certain grade and what steps you can take to maintain or improve your grade. Please feel free to consult with me using email or office visits. However, I will ask that, prior to speaking with me about your grade, you wait at least one day so you may carefully review the assignment and the grading rubric in order to clearly present your concerns to me.

It is highly recommended that woodworking students complete their assignments before the due date listed on Canvas. Written homework may be submitted up to two weeks after the assigned date for full credit. Woodworking requires cumulative learning and practice; therefore, manipulative assignments may be repeated as necessary to improve your score. I will grade and return these projects as quickly as I can.

All feedback is aimed to be delivered in a timely manner and with constructive intent.

Academic dishonesty

For these reasons, the policy of this class is that AI cannot be used at any point in the completion of class assignments, including discussion posts. Any or all of your assignment submissions and discussion posts may be screened by AI detection software, but the real penalty for AI misuse is that you will miss out on an opportunity to learn.

Student behavior or speech that disrupts the instructional setting will not be tolerated. - Do not work with any tools or machinery unless the instructor is present.
- Do not work if you are intoxicated or under the influence of drugs.
