Klamath-Trinity Campus Emergency Procedures

Please review the responsibilities of, and procedures used by, the College of the Redwoods, Klamath Trinity Instructional Site (KTIS) to communicate to faculty, staff, students and the general public during an emergency. It is the responsibility of College of the Redwoods, Klamath-Trinity Instructional Site (KTIS) to protect life and property from the effects of emergency situations within its own jurisdiction. In the event of an emergency, communication shall be the responsibility of the district employees on scene:

- 1. Dial 911, to notify local agency support such as law enforcement or fire services.
- 2. If safe to do so, notify key administrators, departments, and personnel.
- 3. If safe to do so, personnel shall relay threat information, warnings, to ensure the school community is notified.
- 4. Contact 530-625-4821 to notify of situation.
- 5. Contact Hoopa Tribal Education Administration office 530-625-4413
- 6. Notify Public Safety 707-476-4111.

In the event of an emergency, the responsible district employee on the scene will:

- 1. Follow established procedures for the specific emergency as outlined in the College of the Redwoods Emergency Procedure Booklet.
- 2. Lock all doors and turn off lights if in lockdown due to an active shooter or similar emergency.
- 3. Close all window curtains.
- 4. Get all inside to safe location Kitchen area is best internal location.
- 5. If a police officer or higher official arrives, they will assume command.
- 6. Wait until notice of all is clear before unlocking doors.
- 7. If safe to do so, move to the nearest evacuation point outside building (Pooky's Park), directly behind the Hoopa Tribal Education Building.
- Do not leave site, unless it has been deemed safe by the person in command.

Module 1

Week 1 Introductions

- **Concepts:** Introductions, Syllabus, Essays, One Search, AI, Practice presentations, Annotated Bibliography, APA 7.
- **Objectives:** Expectations for the class, grading, rubrics, how to access academic sources and tools to help with the class.
- **Activities:** Introductions, reading syllabus, group discussions, practice presentation.

Week 2: Introduction to Major Historical and Current Theoretical Frameworks of Socialization-Bowlby, Mary Ainsworth, Bandura, Erikson, Jerome Bruner

- Concept: Major current and historical theoretical frameworks of socialization.
- Objectives: Understand key theories of socialization and their relevance.
- Activities: Group work, research Theorists and share with the class.
- Introduce Research paper Assignment: Socialization Theory Paper

Week 3: Continuation of Major Historic and Current Theoretical Frameworks of Socialization Lev Vygotsky, Bronfenbrenner, Piaget, Gardner

- **Concept:** Continued exploration of historical and Current theoretical frameworks.
- **Objectives:** Explore significant historical figures and their contributions to the understanding of socialization (e.g., Freud, Erikson, Vygotsky).

• **Activities:** Part 2 of Group presentations on different theorists and their impact on socialization.

Week 4: Understanding the Agents of Socialization & Interrelatedness of family, school and community as agents of socialization

- **Concept:** Interrelatedness of family, school, and community as agents of socialization.
- **Objectives:** Identify and analyze the roles of family, school, and community in socialization.
- **Activities:** Class discussion on how these agents influence children's development, using case studies. Introduction to literature Review

Module 2

Week 5: Systems of Development & how the child as develops within a system and is influenced by numerous factors of socialization including the role of the family, childcare, schooling and the community. Bronfenbrenner

- **Concept:** How a child develops within a system influenced by family, childcare, schooling, and community.
- Objectives: Explore ecological systems theory and its applications in real-life scenarios.
- Activities: In class lecture and introduction to Reflection Essay on How Different Systems Affect a Child's Development

Week 6: The Role of Education in Socialization & the influence of the teacher and caregivers on children and families.

- Concept: Teachers' and caregivers' influences on children and families.
- Objectives: Analyze the impact of teachers and caregivers on socialization.
- Activities: Guest speaker session with a teacher or childcare provider discussing their role.
- Assessment: In class Lecture and Introduce Reflection Essay on Caregivers' Influence on Socialization

Week 7: Socio-Cultural Influences on Children and Families How to help families experiencing stress

- **Theme:** Impact of age, gender, diverse abilities, language, culture, poverty, racial identity, and socio-economic status on children and families.
- **Objectives:** Analyze how these factors influence a child's development and family dynamics.
- Activities: Develop appropriate strategies to assist families experiencing stress.

In class Assignment Stress Management Resource Development

Week 8: Early Childhood Practices Challenges and benefits-Effective communication strategies.

- **Theme:** Challenges and benefits of early childhood practices that support children and families.
- **Objectives:** Identify effective early childhood practices and their impacts. Analyze diverse practices, patterns and styles of communication, and demonstrate positive effective communication strategies that are appropriate and support all families.
- **Activities:** Lecture and discussion on various early childhood education practices, including play-based learning and individualized instruction.
- Assignment -- In class assignment -Communication Style Analysis

Week 10: Contemporary Social Issues

- **Theme:** Describe contemporary social issues and their effects on families and children.
- **Objectives:** Purpose of recognizing key contemporary issues (e.g., homelessness, mental health, immigration).
- Activities: Research and analyze a contemporary social issue affecting children and families; include interviews with community members if possible-Case Study Analysis- In class assignment-In class Introduce Social Issues Report Reflection essay with Presentation.

Week 11: Stereotypes and Assumptions Legal and Ethical Responsibilities

- **Theme:** Stereotypes and assumptions and their effects upon the family, culture, and the professional community.
- **Objectives:** Explore how stereotypes influence perceptions of families and children.
- Activities: Legal and Ethical Responsibilities In class & Stereotypes and Assumptions

Week 12: Community Support Systems for Families

- **Theme:** Community agencies, referral systems, procedures, and availability of specialized services for families and children, including at-risk populations.
- **Objectives:** Understand local resources available to support families and children.

 Activities: In Class Community Resource Directory and Evaluations-Students will identify and evaluate community support services and agencies available to families and children. Identify appropriate community resources that support children and families and including at-risk populations.

Module 4

Week 13: Family Involvement

- Theme: Effective strategies that empower families and encourage family involvement in children's development & Compare and contrast diverse family structures, parenting styles, culture, tradition, and values and their impact on children and youth.
- **Objectives:** Identify strategies to empower families and encourage family engagement.
- Activities: Students will analyze one's own values, goals and sense of self as related to family history and life experiences, assessing how this impacts relationships with children and families. Family Empowerment Plan In class. Introduce Advocacy Research topics and assignment Week 14- Research Topics

Week 14 Exploring our own family history and examining how it affects our relationships

Values and Relationships Assignment-Week 14 In class

- **Theme:** Own personal family history and how it affects our relationships. Reflect on your own family history and examine how it influences your relationships with children, families, and the wider community. Consider how your experiences shape your professional practices.
- Objective:
 - The purpose of this assignment is to encourage students to engage in self-reflection regarding their family history and experiences. By examining how these influences shape relationships with children, families, and the broader community, students will develop a deeper understanding of their professional practices and the importance of personal history in shaping their approach to their work.
- Activities: Complete a reflective assignment that analyzes your values, goals, and sense of self in relation to your family history. Discuss how these perceptions impact your relationships with children and families. Introduce the Personal Reflections Essay & Advocacy Project.

Week 15: Advocacy Strategies for Children and Families

- **Theme:** Examine advocacy strategies to influence public policy on behalf of children and families.
- Objectives: Understand the importance of advocacy and identify effective strategies.
- Activities: Final Presentation Personal Reflection Essay and Presentation

- **Theme:** Examine advocacy strategies to influence public policy on behalf of children and families.
