Catalog Description

A course for Low Intermediate ESL Students that develops listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills. Students will work on improving their conversation skills and their ability to write a focused paragraph. They will learn strategies for understanding authentic English texts and writing compound sentences.

Course Student Learning Outcomes (from course outline of record)

- 1. Participate in increasingly extended conversations in spoken English in familiar contexts.
- 2. Interpret meaning in shorter simplified or authentic texts with some unfamiliar words on familiar topics.
- 3. Write a short note or brief report with relevant ideas and appropriate details in a short cohesive paragraph.
- 4. Write simple and compound sentences with some consistency in mechanics and punctuation.

Class Content

We will cover the following course outcomes and concepts:

Course Objectives

1. Engage in topics beyond basic survival or routine activities using a range of words and phrases.

2. Comprehend spoken English in increasingly extended conversations on familiar topics, spoken slowly and with some rephrasing or repetition.

- 3. Produce a variety of correspondence (emails, notes, short letters) for the workplace and personal use.
- 4. Fill out simple forms that require some detailed biographical or personal information.
- 5. Identify the purpose and audience of a shorter authentic text (letter from school, brochure, narrative).
- 6. Read for main idea and supporting details in a paragraph.
- 7. Compare and evaluate quality of information using informational sources (price lists, bar graphs, pie charts).
- 8. Identify and evaluate statements of fact and opinion, using simple discourse markers of opinion (I think, etc).
- 9. Write a loosely organized paragraph or dialog based on personal experiences or familiar material.
- 10. Apply word analysis strategies to infer the meaning of unfamiliar words.
- 11. Determine meaning of frequently used idioms and phrasal verbs in clear contexts.
- 12. Understand and use word order consistently in basic grammatical patterns.
- 13. Use most present, past, and future tenses appropriately in context and with some consistency in accuracy.
- 14. Use a range of present modals (necessity, possibility, and advisability).
- 15. Edit writing for capitalization, sentence punctuation, basic grammatical form and spelling.
- 16. Recognize and practice self-correction of common problematic sounds.

- 1. Appropriate use of past, present and future tenses in English.
- 2. Problematic sounds, stress, and rhythm of English.
- 3. Speaking skills for the workplace and social use.
- 4. Note-taking strategies.
- 5. Reading strategies for longer simplified or authentic texts with some unfamiliar words.
- 6. Vocabulary-learning strategies and high frequency word lists.
- 7. Practice speaking for several minutes at a time on familiar topics.
- 8. Organization of a main idea and supporting details in a paragraph.
- 9. Reading for specific information in authentic informational sources.
- 10. Format of basic written documents (emails, letters, notes).
- 11. Punctuation use (commas, capitalization for proper nouns).

- 12. Word function in a sentence.
- 13. Basic sentence structure (independent clauses, prepositional phrases, coordinating conjunctions).
- 14. Present modals (necessity, possibility, advisability).
- 15. Comparisons with "as."
- 16. Comparative adjectives and superlatives.
- 17. Gerunds.
- 18. Infinitives.
- 19. Modals Might/may/will.
- 20. Count and non-count nouns.
- 21. Using much/many properly.
- 22. Auxilary verbs.
- 23. Compound sentences.
