Catalog Description

An introductory study of earth systems, earth materials and how earth processes impact human activities and how human activities influence the geological environment. Students will investigate geologic hazards, including landsliding, earthquakes, and volcanic activity, and make decisions concerning mitigating action. Students will also learn about water, mineral, and energy resources within the context of earth systems and consider issues of sustainability.

- 1. Describe how the scientific method is used to understand natural phenomena.
- 2. Assess the geologic principles, consequences, and corrective/adaptive options related to specific earth hazards such as earthquakes, floods, and landslides.
- 3. Describe the origin of geologic resources (such as groundwater, fossil fuels, and minerals) and the consequences of resource-management choices.

Assignment Category Descriptions:

Lessons and other Learning Activities

These are online "worksheets" that involve short activities. Activities are scored for points and generally you are allowed unlimited attempts on activities. You will be assigned several lessons each week, with multiple lessons assigned for each due day. Lessons are learning activities, not assessments, and thus they should be low stress. These will comprise the majority of your time in this course. This grading

category also includes practice quizzes and self-assessment activities. Although they do not count for much of your grade, they are essential to success in the other grade categories.

Discussions and Informal Writing

Each module contains at least one informal writing assignment. These will either be in the form of a timed "quiz" or a discussion forum. Most discussions will require around 200 words although, there are also shorter "quick check-in" discussions, which are shorter. Some discussions require two posts, and the second post must be made after reading the posts of your classmates as well as instructor comments and feedback. Informal Writing "quizzes" are designed to encourage you to write freely, without researching or overly revising your answer. All informal writing, including discussions will be graded on a complete/incomplete basis with a small penalty for late completion. You will not be graded on scientific accuracy or writing quality, although you are encouraged to practice writing well and to strive for accuracy.

End of Module (EOM) Quizzes

At the end of each module (seven total in the semester), you will complete two quizzes to assess your learning over that module. These quizzes are designed to be a direct assessment of what you learned in the lessons. These quizzes are comprised of two parts, both accessed through Canvas. The first part will include automatically graded questions such as multiple-choice questions. You will have three attempts on this part of the EOM quiz *and your grade is the average of your scores on each attempt*. The second part will have short answer questions to be graded by the instructor and you will have just one attempt. Your best five EOM quizzes of each type will count toward your final grade.

Essays

There are two essays related to Module 3: Mt. Rainier and Module 6: To Frack or not to Frack. Each essay will summarize what you learned in those modules. After your first draft submission, you will have the opportunity to review additional essay related materials, self-evaluate and submit a second draft. Additional third and fourth drafts are optional for bonus points. Your final score will be based on two factors, the overall merit of your first draft and the improvement of your later drafts.

Late Work

Most late work will be accepted with no penalty, until the last day of the semester (see dates above) at 11:59 pm. No work will be accepted after that point, except in the case of an incomplete grade contract.

There is a schedule of "due dates" in Canvas. These dates are generally intended as target dates to provide a guideline to keep you on track. In order to ensure that your grade somewhat reflective of your progress, Canvas will automatically assign zero scores to missing assignments after the target date. These zero scores will be replaced with your grade once the item is graded.

Discussion posts, informal writing, and essay first drafts will be penalized if they are late (see rubrics above). It is important that there are enough discussion posts for your peers to respond to and/or reflect on. However, these late penalties are also intended as a motivational tool to help you stay on track with your assignments. In many cases, the discussions will only unlock when you have completed prerequisite assignments, therefore you will need to stay on track with all your work to not be penalized for late discussions.

I believe that online classes are intended for students who need flexibility. If there are circumstances that make it difficult for you to complete work on time, I am willing to work with you and grant extensions when appropriate, just let me know! If you fall behind, it is important to communicate with

me, the instructor. I would love to help you find strategies to get caught up and communication will help you avoid being dropped for non-attendance.

Dropped Scores

With the exception of the essay category, your two lowest scores in each grade category will be dropped from your final grade. This means that you can either score poorly on two assignments in that category or skip two assignments in that category entirely without penalty to your grade.

Class participation and Attendance policy

If this class were offered in person, it would meet four times per week. I therefore recommend that you log into this class at a similar frequency. Spacing out studying has been shown to be an effective study strategy! However, assignments will typically be open at least one week prior to the due date, so you can plan your own weekly schedule however you'd like.

Your participation will be tracked through the completion of scored assignments such as lessons and discussions. School policy allows me to initiate a withdrawal for a student who has "excessive absences" prior to the *Last day for faculty-initiated W* deadline. For this online course "excessive absences" will be defined as missing one week or more of assignment deadlines with no communication with the instructor. I will typically reach out to you prior to dropping you from the course. It is your responsibility to participate in this course on a regular basis. If you intend to withdraw from the class, it is also your responsibility to do so through Web Advisor before the deadline. Do not assume that I will initiate the drop.

Contacting your instructor

The best way to reach me is through Pronto or Canvas messages. Pronto is a chat app linked to Canvas. You can open the Pronto chat in Canvas, or use the app on your smartphone (look for "Pronto Team Communication" by Hitlabs in your app store). You can ask questions in the whole class chat or through a direct message. I am most likely to see and respond to your message immediately if you use Pronto, but I will also check Canvas messages and email. Sometimes I may be away from my computer or involved in other things and might not answer your message right away. Barring exceptional circumstances, such as illness or power outage, I will respond to messages in Pronto, Canvas, or email within at most 24 hours Monday through Friday. If I am available weekends, I will respond to urgent messages, but I cannot guarantee that I will be in internet communication every weekend. If you have not heard back from me within a reasonable time frame, it is possible that I have lost your message, so please resend.

If you want to meet with me over video (or voice), we can also do this in Pronto or set up a Zoom meeting time. If my Pronto status is "online" (green dot) this means that I am most likely available to meet with you. Send me a message asking to meet. If I am not currently available, you can request an appointment using <u>whenisgood.net/WrightOfficeHour</u> and I will send you an invitation for a time that works for both of us. This a request form, not an appointment reservation form. The more availability you enter, the more likely I can find a time that works for me.
