Catalog Description

An introduction to the development of the "West" from the era of Absolutism to the present. A central theme will be how a weak and fragmented western Europe became a major influence in the world, strongly identified with modernity, technology, and expanding economic, political, cultural, and social systems. Students will investigate the increasing power of the nation-state and systems of empire, and the ways in which ideas of race, class, and gender played a part in this evolution. Special attention will be paid to the evolution of ideologies, such as capitalism, imperialism, communism, and globalization. *This section of HIST-5 will focus on the theme of protest and rebellion.*

- 1. Analyze and assess the merits of various historical interpretations.
- 2. Analyze significant historical developments (social, cultural, political, economic, diplomatic, technological/scientific, global context) through the application of the historical concepts of process, context, and/or difference.
- 3. Apply secondary and/or primary source material to construct written and oral, logical, historical arguments.

We will use a Canvas class website for posting materials, assignments, grades, and a weekly "What to do this week" list.

Reading Quizzes (20-25 points each, submit on Canvas)

A Reading Quiz is due in Canvas each Wednesday (by midnight). The quiz consists of multiple choice questions which may be easily answered as you complete the required reading in *Western Civilizations*. Late quizzes lose 1 point per day and may not be submitted later than 1 week past the deadline.

Primary Source Quizzes (10-12 points each, submit in class)

An in-class quiz will test your familiarity with the required primary source reading. Group discussion and analysis will follow the quiz. Primary source quizzes may not be submitted late or made up if missed.

Critical Response Paper (100 points, submit on Canvas)

Read one of the scholarly articles or chapters provided (your choice) and write approximately 800 words describing its findings, critiquing its methodology, and formulating your own connections to current events. See Canvas for full instructions and a grading rubric. I am happy to give you feedback on rough draft material if you send it to me well ahead of the due date.

Essay: Plan a Protest or Rebellion (100 points, submit on Canvas)

Use the outline provided to write approximately 800 words planning a protest or rebellion in the West from c. 1500 to the present, or in the future. Your plan must utilize one primary source and one secondary source, and include analysis of at least two examples from the history of Western Civilization since c. 1500. Be prepared to discuss your plan in class. See Canvas for full instructions and grading rubric. I am happy to give you feedback on rough draft material if you send it to me well ahead of the due date.

Research Paper (150 points, submit on Canvas)

Write approximately 2,000 words exploring a thesis of your choice relevant to protest and rebellion in Western Civilization since the Reformation. Cite at least 1 reliable primary source and at least 2 reliable secondary sources. List sources in a bibliography at the end of the paper. An in-class Research Paper Workshop and a quiz will help you get started on this assignment. See Canvas for full instructions and grading rubric. I am happy to give you feedback on rough draft material if you send it to me well ahead of the due date.

Midterm and Final Exams (150 points each, submit in class)

The Midterm & Final Exams will test your knowledge of material from lecture and the textbook. Each exam has two parts (75 points each): multiple choice and essay. Study sessions and sample questions in class and on Canvas will help you prepare for the test.

- 4. Public Safety shall relay threat information, warnings, and alerts through the Everbridge emergency alert system, Public address system, and when possible, updates on the college website, to ensure the school community is notified.
- 5. Follow established procedures for the specific emergency as outlined in the College of the Redwoods Emergency Procedure Booklet, (evacuation to a safe zone, shelter in place, lockdown, assist others if possible, cooperate with First Responders, etc.).
- 6. If safe to do so, notify key administrators, departments, and personnel.
- 7. Do not leave campus, unless it is necessary to preserve life and/or has been deemed safe by the person in command.

Klamath Trinity Campus Emergency Procedures

 - f. Notify Public Safety 707-476-4111.
- 2. In the event of an emergency, the responsible district employee on scene will:
 - a. Follow established procedures for the specific emergency as outlined in the College of the Redwoods Emergency Procedure Booklet.

- b. Lock all doors and turn off lights if in lockdown due to an active shooter or similar emergency. c. Close all window curtains.
- d. Get all inside to safe location Kitchen area is best internal location.
- e. If a police officer or higher official arrives, they will assume command.
- f. Wait until notice of all is clear before unlocking doors.
- g. If safe to do so, move to the nearest evacuation point outside building (Pooky's Park), directly behind the Hoopa Tribal Education Building.
- h. Do not leave site, unless it has been deemed safe by the person in command. Student Support Services (required for online classes)
