Catalog Description

The second course in a comprehensive study of pre hospital emergency medicine to meet State of California requirements for an Emergency Medical Technician-Paramedic license. The course meets accreditation requirements of the Committee on Accreditation of Educational Programs for the EMS Professions (CoAEMSP). The course will teach pre-hospital emergency medical care at the advanced life support (ALS) level in accordance with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's National EMS Education Standards.

Course Student Learning Outcomes (from course outline of record)

- 1. Apply the basic concepts of development, pathophysiology and pharmacology to assessment and management of emergency patients and communicate the findings to others.
- 2. Integrate pathophysiological principles and assessment findings to formulate a field impression and implement the treatment plan for a trauma patient.
- 3. Integrate pathophysiological principles and assessment findings to formulate a field impression and implement the treatment plan for a medical patient.
- 4. Manage the scene of an emergency safely and efficiently.
