 - c. Close all window curtains.
 - d. Get all inside to safe location Kitchen area is best internal location.
 - e. If a police officer or higher official arrives, they will assume command.
 - f. Wait until notice of all is clear before unlocking doors.

- g. If safe to do so, move to the nearest evacuation point outside building (Pooky's Park), directly behind the Hoopa Tribal Education Building.

Course length: One semester. Each section (22B, 22P, 22W) can be taken once for credit. There is no prerequisite. This class is CSU transferable.

I. TEXTS

II. BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE COURSE

Class instruction in the fundamentals of performance on brass, woodwind, and percussion instruments commonly used in a concert band setting, as well as the fundamentals of music reading. Class includes a required public performance at the end of the semester.

III. MAJOR GOALS AND OBJECTIVES OF THE COURSE

Upon completion of this course, students enrolled in Music 22B are expected to:

- 1. Demonstrate sufficient mastery of valve positions to play chromatically from lowest to highest commonly-used notes on a given brass instrument.
- 2. Produce acceptable tone on a given brass instrument through employment of correct embouchure and breath support techniques.
- 3. Accurately read basic music notation, including commonly-used pitch, rhythm, and expression symbols, and hold one's part in band music at the Class D junior high/middle school level.

Upon completion of this course, students enrolled in Music 22P are expected to:

- 1. Demonstrate correct sticking technique in order to play chromatically from lowest to highest commonly-used notes (mallet percussion instruments); demonstrate the ability to accurately change drumhead pitch through correct pedal movement (timpani).
 - 2. Play essential snare drum rudiments (snare drum).

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- 3. Demonstrate acceptable tone production (all percussion instruments).
- 4. Accurately read basic music notation, including commonly-used pitch, rhythm, and expression symbols, and hold one's part in band music at the Class D junior high/middle school level.

Upon completion of this course, students enrolled in Music 22W are expected to:

- 1. Demonstrate sufficient mastery of key positions to play chromatically from lowest to highest commonly-used notes on a given woodwind instrument.
- 2. Produce acceptable tone on woodwind instruments through employment of correct embouchure and breath support techniques.
 - 3. Accurately read basic music notation, including commonly-used pitch, rhythm, and

expression symbols, and hold one's part in band music at the Class D junior high/middle school level.

IV. TYPICAL ACTIVITIES

- 1. Assembling instruments as a group.
- 2. Warming up by holding long tones of 8-16 beats.
- 3. Performing ensemble call-and-response using simple pitch/rhythm patters that are reproduced by ear, to develop aural cognition.
 - 4. Performing simple dynamics exercises on a single note or short musical phrase.
 - 5. Playing scale patterns to develop fingering facility.
 - 6. Tonguing exercises on progressively more challenging rhythmic patterns.
 - 7. Performing rudimental and sticking exercises (percussionists).
 - 8. Playing simple band music as an ensemble.

V. MEANS AND METHODS OF EVALUATION

- 1. Ratings achievement on skills (30% of final grade). This grade will be determined on the following basis:
 - A: Student demonstrates complete mastery of all, or nearly all, of the course's principal concepts.
- B: Student demonstrates complete mastery of many of the course's principal concepts, and adequate mastery of all of them.
 - C: Student demonstrates adequate mastery of most of the course's principal concepts.
- D: Student is unable to demonstrate adequate mastery of several of the course's principal concepts. F: Student demonstrates mastery of few or none of the course's principal concepts.
- 2. Rehearsal & class participation (30% of final grade). A student receives 10 participation points for each class attended. The final participation grade is calculated as follows:
 - A: 260 280 B: 240 250 C: 220 230 D: 200 210 F: under 200

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3. Performance participation (40% of final grade). Participation in the end-of-the-semester performance is a crucial component of the course, and is mandatory.

VI. SEMESTER SCHEDULE

- Week 4. Basic note production (to 8 notes), Bb concert scale, tonguing, division of simple beats.
