Catalog Description

Students learn to identify and examine social problems using a sociological perspective. Sociological concepts and theories are used to analyze social problems. Social movements such as global environmental, US civil, women's, LGBTQIA+, and disability rights are explored with consideration of solutions for social change. This course requires critical reading and analysis.

- 1. Employ a sociological perspective to evaluate a major social problem.
- 2. Explain how two or more social problems are related.

3. Use course tools to propose a potential solution for a social problem related to gender, self-identity, ethnicity, race, socioeconomic status, sexuality, worldview, collective behavior and/ or values.
