Course delivery: This course is delivered and taught completely online; no classroom meetings. This class has no required virtual meetings. This class is a **paced online class** that students can engage on any day of the week, at any time. As a paced class, there are specific activities which take place each week. There are specific due dates for assignments and discussion boards, quizzes, tests etc.

Course Description:

Introduction to the discipline of sociology including major theories, concepts and methods. Topics include: sociological imagination, social structure and interaction, culture, social groups and organizations, and social institutions. Also includes inquiry into social inequalities such as race/class/gender/global stratification.

In this class, students learn to (outcomes listed below)

1. Employ a sociological perspective to critically evaluate a social issue.
2. Explain the relationship between socialization and culture.
3. Use sociological concepts to evaluate complex ideas.

Student Commitment:

This class employs a reading and critical thinking intensive course model.

In any of my 16 week courses, you can expect to spend about 7 to 11 hours per week every week concentrating on activities for Sociology. In an online course, you can expect to spend at least this much time.

For students working on basic study skills, *even more time* may be needed to work on personal academic skills such as reading retention, exam or quiz prep approaches, information management & large assignment self-pacing.

Each week of an online class involves

1. reading or studying of course texts,
2. engagement with online lecture material in the form of content pages and/or instructor provided videos,
3. participation in online activities such as quizzes, interactive learning modules & colleague discussion boards &
4. self-directed work on assignments such as essays or sustained projects.

Online Course Readiness:

It's possible this is your first online class, you are unfamiliar with Canvas (the online learning platform College of the Redwoods uses), or are returning to college after some time away from school. If any of these circumstances describe you, or you want to brush up on your canvas skills, I recommend utilizing [CR's canvas resources](#) now so you can get ready for our class.

Computer Skills:

Online classes require computer skills. It is your responsibility to meet technological skill levels required for and technological challenges associated with your success in this class. Whereas there is some student tech support available through CR and the company that publishes the textbook we use, your instructor cannot provide you with adequate tech support.

Skills needed for this class include ability to:

- navigate course websites;
- locate, open, download, create, edit, save, and attach files for submission online;
- comfortably use a word processor;
- save files in Microsoft Word (.docx files), or word processing program –AND- convert files to portable files (.pdf). Assignments will be due as pdfs through the online learning management system;
- ability to create, upload, and view video files;
- engage in basic trouble shooting or resource identification and utilization in order to solve tech related issues.

Canvas

is a website which allows you to download information needed for class. Syllabus materials, course reading, course resources, exam study guides, exams, discussion boards, and regular class announcements are the some of the materials available through our class site.

Although most students find they access this site multiple times each day on 4-5 days of each week during the course, at the minimum you need to access this site a minimum of twice per week for 16 weeks. Summer session students should plan to use this site daily, on at least 5 or 6 days of any given week.

You must have reliable access to the internet to succeed in this class. Broadband, cable, or satellite internet access is recommended; this course involves multi-media content. Anticipate power outages and internet access delays by planning ahead to submit assignments early; deadlines for this course are your responsibility to meet.

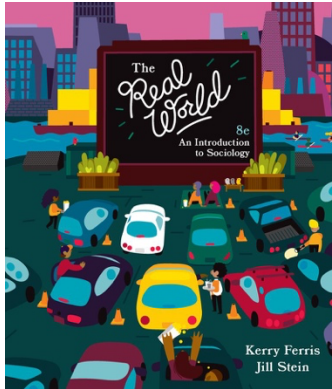
Computers

Confirm your presence in the online classroom:

Log in to the website and post to the "URGENT ITEM Introduction Attendance Discussion" discussion forum no later than 11:59pm on Wednesday, August 23 (Wednesday of the first week) to confirm your presence in the online classroom. Doing so will confirm your enrollment in the course and avoid being dropped as a "no show." You can and will be dropped from the class if you do not

- log in and post to the attendance discussion and

- complete assignments and activities associated with modules 1A, 1B (which are scheduled to occur during the first week of class), and
- complete assignments and activities associated with module 2 (which are scheduled to occur during the second week of class).

Grading

Point system (total possible points = 1000). No curve.

The Real World Chapter & Video/Activity Quizzes: worth 300 points (or 30% of the total).

- Each Real World chapter has an associated quiz available through the canvas class modules. Occasional videos and small class activities have short quizzes available through the modules as well.
- Quizzes are multiple choice & occasional short answer style questions
- Complete chapter quizzes only after participation in all module content related to a given textbook chapter.
- Additional chapter content questions & content video quizzes are how extra credit for our class is built into this area of the class structure.

Final Assignment worth 100 points (or 10% of the total)

- This is a mandatory final culmination essay which integrates the Sociological Imagination (a major course concept) with “Hand to Mouth” (a major course reading) & content concepts from The Real World.
- This assignment posts to canvas & will take you many weeks to complete. Do not wait to start this assignment once it becomes available; begin as soon as you gain access to it.
- This assignment is due as a pdf attachment submitted through the canvas assignment portal.
- Failure to submit this essay may result in a 50 pt grade penalty (to be factored into your grade at the end of the term). Better to turn something in for review than to skip this one!
 - You are encouraged to create a comprehensive outline for your essay & to write from your outline.
 - You are encouraged to seek writing support through the CR writing support services for this essay (bring

the assignment to them for help writing an outline, bring a draft for review support, etc).

- If you need support accessing writing support or tutoring, contact your instructor directly through canvas messages

Class Colleague Course & Assignment Preparation

Discussions worth 100 points (or 10% of the total)

- Discussion boards post as links through the modules on our class canvas site;
- These are scheduled to occur a handful of times this term (they do not occur on all weeks);
- Discussion boards are intended to create interactive connection between class colleagues, to help learners notice areas of personal success and challenge related to course material or specific assignments, and to prepare each student to identify questions to take back to their instructor for direct learning support;
- When assigned, **these involve two due dates in a week**. A substantive authored response to a prompt is due by **Mondays @ 11:59**; subsequent colleague engagement posts are due by **Fridays @ 11:59p**

Inquizitive: worth 300 points (or 30% of the total)

- These are Norton textbook “The Real World: An Introduction to Sociology” video game style interactive assignments meant to reinforce textbook chapter instructional content. Think of these as a study tool.
For each Real World textbook chapter we cover this term, you are assigned to complete the InquiZitive activity. There are also “familiarity” with InquiZitive activities to complete prior to beginning your work with this textbook.
- InquiZitive activities are graded for completion. Your instructor will manually transpose completion from the Norton website into our class canvas grade book at several junctures this term (grading is not managed instantaneously/ no LMS integration is used for this class).
- You can “work ahead” with these. Each inquizitive is due prior to your taking of its correlating canvas chap[ter quiz
- The amount of time each chapter’s activity will take is determined by your familiarity with the content.
 - Inquizitives should be engaged **after reading a text chapter**,
 - **after participating in module content**, and
 - **before taking a chapter quiz**.

Exams: worth 200 points (or 20% of the total)

- There are two exams this term. These include multiple choice, short answer & full format essay questions.
- Exam content includes material contained in The Real World, canvas modules & Hand to Mouth.
- These are due on specific weekdays, by specific time associated deadlines. Note exam due dates ahead of time, portals will not be made available outside of the specified time frames.

Final Course Letter Grade Calculations

This class is graded on a scale. At the end of the term, your total number of earned points= your final grade. Canvas does not calculate your final course grade, your instructor does. Final grades post through webadvisor (not canvas).

Course Participation Policy

Participation in this online course requires regular accessing of the course site and materials as well as routine turning in of assignments, activities, and quizzes.

- Failure to log into the class site for more than 10 sequential days may result in being dropped, without notice, for course nonparticipation.
- Simply logging into the class site does not constitute participation.
- Missing of any 3 sequential course due dates (assignments, linked course activities, discussion boards, tests, or document submissions) may result in being dropped, without notice, for course nonparticipation.
- Failure to participate in the class for ten or more days may result in being dropped, without notice, for course nonparticipation.
- Participation includes posting comments or discussions, reviewing course lecture, video and/or posted articles, slides, or material linked through course modules & communications.
- **Late Work** is never accepted after the end of the term. Late work generally falls into three categories.
 - One is when **normal workflow circumstances** apply. This means no major illness, surgery, or catastrophic change in circumstance has occurred and a request for late work has happened after a due date has occurred. Late work

is generally not acceptable when normal workflow circumstances have been experienced and due dates have passed. If you noticed you have missed something by accident, fell off the internet for a week, or need a course grade remediation strategy, please send a direct message inquiry right away so we can work together to determine what's possible.

- The second category is **excruciating circumstance with impact on workflow**. This means a major illness, surgery, or catastrophic change in workflow circumstance has occurred. Some formats of work can be accepted late when there is an excruciating circumstance. Direct communication is encouraged so we can do our best to meet your learning needs.
- The third category is **anticipated needs**. Some formats of work can receive small extensions when you look ahead to see projected conflicts. Other formats cannot receive extension. (For example, discussion boards require colleague engagement and we cannot negotiate with colleagues to review your contributions following the deadlines of discussion boards). An example of an anticipated need circumstance would be seeing that a quiz is due on a Friday but realizing your day off from your job to focus on your studies is Saturday. In this case, sending a message on Tuesday to request consideration of a quiz extension to Saturday. Another example would be seeing that a test is schedule to close at 10a on a Wednesday when your best "testing window" for focus is 1-3p on Wednesday due to availability of your childcare. In this case, sending a message on Friday to request consideration of a 5 hour exam extension. In the case of upcoming anticipated needs, please message directly as soon as possible (with as much specific information as possible) so your anticipated needs receive the consideration they require.

 - b. Lock all doors and turn off lights if in lockdown due to an active shooter or similar emergency.
 - c. Close all window curtains.
 - d. Get all inside to safe location Kitchen area is best internal location.
 - e. If a police officer or higher official arrives, they will assume command.
 - f. Wait until notice of all is clear before unlocking doors.
 - g. If safe to do so, move to the nearest evacuation point outside building (Pooky's Park), directly behind the Hoopa Tribal Education Building.
